Overview

While national governments negotiated the Paris Agreement, the goal – to limit the increase in global temperature to under 2 degrees Celsius – can only be achieved if state and local leaders, businesses, scientists, students, nonprofits and others step up.

The Global Climate Action Summit will convene more than a thousand of these leaders who see climate change as an existential threat and are committed to rolling back the forces of carbonization. Hosted by Governor Jerry Brown, the Summit will underscore the urgency of the threat and channel the energy and idealism of people everywhere to overcome it.

Summit leaders will quantify the carbon emissions sub-national actors have already cut, secure bold commitments from them to do even more, show that decarbonization and economic growth go hand-in-hand, and galvanize a global movement that embraces people from all walks of life.

More than just an event, the Summit will catalyze climate action through 2020 and beyond.

Specifics on the Summit

The Summit will be the first time a U.S. state convenes people from around the globe to support the Paris Agreement. California is well-suited to this role: The economy is sixth-largest in the world, and the state has the most ambitious greenhouse gas reduction targets in North America. But this Summit is not about California – it's about the world.

The Summit will take place in San Francisco, California, on September 12-14, 2018. It will start with an interfaith service in Grace Cathedral and an opening ceremony at City Hall.

The timing is important. In December of 2018, countries will gather at the U.N. Framework Convention on Climate Change's annual Conference of the Parties (COP) and begin setting targets for the 5-year period that begins in 2020. The more that sub-national leaders pledge to cut emissions at the Summit next September, the more likely national leaders will be to consider strong decarbonization targets at COP 24 next December.

The plenary sessions will take place at the Moscone Center, with other events occurring throughout the city. Beyond the main agenda, the program will include workshops, exhibits and breakout events in which participants can connect and collaborate with one another. The Summit will also have dedicated spaces that will feature climate innovations, host members of the media and provide a setting for community activities. Organizers are considering other climate-focused events such as a film festival and/or concert.

The months preceding the Summit will feature "Road to" events organized and hosted by some of the groups partnering with organizers, so they can generate momentum for climate action.

Summit Leadership

The Summit is hosted by Governor Brown and the State of California. Three co-chairs as well as a Steering Committee will join Governor Brown to advise on the agenda and generate global support for the Summit. A Host Committee is in formation to support operations and fundraising.

The co-chairs are:

- UN Framework Convention on Climate Change Executive Secretary Patricia Espinosa;
- Mahindra Group Chair Anand Mahindra; and
- UN Secretary General's Special Envoy for Cities and Climate Change Michael Bloomberg

The planning, organization and execution of the Summit will be led by the Office of Governor Brown. The co-chairs and their respective organizations – UNFCCC, Mahindra Inc., and Bloomberg Philanthropies – will help lead this monumental effort.

In addition, the following entities are serving key roles to make this Summit happen:

- UN Foundation is the fiduciary sponsor for the Summit, and will provide strategic, fundraising and communications support.
- Mission 2020, led by Christiana Figueres, the former UNFCCC Executive Secretary, along with the Governor's Office will work with experts and organizations to deliver tangible results to be announced before and at the Summit.

Members of the Policy Steering Committee include:

The Steering Committee, co-led by Mission 2020, will advise the Summit leaders on the best ways to mobilize constituencies to tackle climate change – before and during the Summit. In addition, the Steering Committee will help produce:

- An estimate of how much non-state actors have helped cut carbon emissions to date;
- Case studies that show low-carbon transformation in firms and communities; and
- Announcements to cut emissions even more, including joint efforts across industry.

Broader Reach

Summit organizers will build support by partnering with other groups that are enlisting non-state actors in the fight against climate change, such as the Under 2 Coalition, We Are Still In, C40, the Global Covenant of Mayors for Climate and Energy, We Mean Business and Climate Action Network International. The team will make special efforts to engage diverse constituencies to build the most robust and inclusive coalition for climate action.

Budget

We anticipate a budget of \$10 million, to include:

- Venue reservations and event production
- Operations and project management
- Development of content and products
- Communications, including traditional and digital media, marketing, and branding
- Partnership engagement and coalition-building
- Fundraising and supporter outreach

Financial Support

The success of the Summit will depend on strong support from individuals, foundations, governments and businesses. Supporters will be able to engage Summit leaders and shape an event that will catalyze climate action worldwide.



Aimee, my apologies, as well, for the delayed response. I wanted Chris to chime in first. (Chris, meet the underside of this here bus; bus, this is Chris;)

Thank you very much for your work putting together the Paris letter and recruiting signers. Like Chris said, it wouldn't have happened without you. And I do think (and hope) its helped make a positive impact.

I too like your letter below. I think it hits precisely the right tone and does will to identify the buckets of activities/necessary support functions that all of our states could use to collectively to push climate action at the state, national and international levels together. I think it proceeds directly from the Govs' Paris letter, so I also like the idea of replying to that email chain. Nobody who was part of that is gonna want to be left behind on this next exciting group effort! But also, we should make a targeted effort to see if we cant attract Mass and VT, and maybe others from the GOP side. It's a stretch - but with a major dividend. And they might be more inclined if we start out as a small group of 2-3 states approaching them, rather than a behemoth list of D governors pressuring one or two of them to join us. I guess what Im saying is lets send them a similar note.

I agree also with Chris that each state is gonna put a different amount of effort into an initiative like this - and that that's ok. And I don't think it gets far without CA's energy, expertise and leadership, so also don't have any issue with yall pressing the conversation forward.

As regards a Govs Climate Alliance, generally, Ive oscillated for and against the idea, since Nov, but ultimately found myself in the "pro" column for precisely the arguments you outline below. Ever since, my main point of emphasis, as Ive (somewhat obnoxiously) inconsistently inserted myself into these deliberative conversations, is that there hasn't yet appeared to be one group or proposal that readily captures all of the buckets of activity that you outline below. Theres of course a plethora of advocate and funder interest, a leadership vacuum from the feds, and a voracious appetite at home and abroad, for this sort of governors' initiative. But each of the outside group comers so far seems to be really strong in an area or two (policy, comms, national strategy, knowledge or int'l process, rolodex, sufficient funder support, etc), but short in the others.

So that leads me to think that we should pull together an initial coalition of the willing (or most eager) states, to decide for ourselves the universe of activities in which we'll engage together (and I think you begin to summarize that very well below), and the structure that will assist that. And from there we can approach the different groups (G'town, Rhodium, UNF, whomever) about which of them will play a roll. We may have to broker peace or force

collaboration, but surely the collective interest can prevail. And after all, if not us - who?

Anyway, that's my \$0.02. Maybe we can discuss in DC this week. Thanks for putting this together, and for the great continued partnership.

I agree with your conclusion and the letter only underscored what we've been discussing. However I also think that anything we might help coalesce will continue to require special leadership from us to spur on. The model could evolve – and I believe states will appreciate CA making room for others – but I'm fairly certain that there will inevitably be some states more able/willing to do more, instigate more, take on more and others who will play but not lend the same initiative. And this would be fine. States can self select if we create the space to make that happen. SO I think your letter is a good idea and sets the right tone. I'm happy to work with you to facilitate the discussion or to simply harmonize at the right moment.

Hi guys,

Thanks so much for all your leadership and hustle on getting the Paris letter out earlier this week. It definitely would not have happened without you both.

I have been thinking about the Governor's Climate Alliance thing, and talking with Rick and Hewlett. My sense (I think you guys have already been here for a while... what can I say, I'm slow) is that it doesn't work as configured in their proposal, but that we do have a need for more capacity than we have at present--it can't always be us staff running around trying to corral each other for sign on, and that we could also use some help both with horizon-scanning for potential challenges and thinking more strategically about how to broadcast our collective voices internationally.

I drafted an email which I am going to send around to the email chain from the Paris letter to this effect, to see if we can get a call set up next week to discuss whether and how we might all collaborate either through existing or new mechanisms on these issues. See below and let me know what you think. I'm sensitive to not wanting to be the 800 pound Californian gorilla, but I do think based on the Paris letter experience that we could use a little more help, and it doesn't make sense for any one of our states to necessarily be the main driver, although we all have to have a stake in it.

As always, I'd be grateful for your frank feedback and am glad to be working side by side on the good fight. :)

Dear all,

I am grateful for and proud of our Governors' statement on the need for continued US participation in the Paris Agreement earlier this week, and for the leadership of everyone on this email chain for making it happen. No doubt there will be many more occasions in the coming months and years that will benefit from our Governors' strong voices on climate change.

This is not an issue of partisanship, but of principles. As our letter clearly stated, climate change is an existential threat to our states, our economies, and the health and prosperity of our citizens. In California, we would be keen to explore with you all the idea of continued, targeted coordination to speak with one positive and proactive voice on climate concerns.

My sense is that there are three areas we might initially consider:

- 1) <u>Coordination directly amongst and between our Governors' offices, and communications support to project our Governors' voices nationally and internationally on climate change, specifically to make clear that we intend to continue US leadership on climate action and that we continue to stand with others across the country and around the world that seek to do the same:</u>
- 2) <u>Analytical support for our Governors' offices</u> to understand what the collective impact of our states' clean energy and climate change efforts amount to, whether and how this can stopgap flagging national ambition, esp. in regards to the US Nationally Determined Contribution to the Paris Accord, and the ability to communicate around that effectively in a way that prevents the disintegration of international climate cooperation; and
- 3) Expert guidance and support for our Governors to engage in international climate processes effectively (according to their level of interest), both to keep the US on target through subnational action to meet our global goals and to ensure that the "architecture" of the Paris Agreement remains intact.

I believe that some of the excellent support we have from existing efforts can help to support these needs, but that <u>additional capacity may also be needed</u>. This additional support could be provided through existing efforts, such as Georgetown, the Under2Coalition, etc., or through a new one. We are fortunate that at the moment there are many resources keen to be at our disposal to support us further, but in order to make best use of them, we need to tell them what we need. Many of us have already begun to discuss these needs with various experts and organizations, but I do not think this is a question any one state can or should answer for the others.

I would be keen to know whether you all would be interested in discussing how we organize and resource ourselves for the opportunities that will inevitably be presented to continue our strong subnational leadership on a low-carbon future together in the next few years.

If you all agree, I would propose that we organize a call amongst us all in the near future to discuss this question. I assume this email list represents essentially the set of key officials/experts in our respective Governors' offices on climate issues, but please flag anyone who may be missing. If you are not interested in participating please say so—no offense taken. And to be clear, California is happy to facilitate the initial conversations but we feel strongly that all Governors' offices should feel equal ownership if this is to succeed.

As we look to the potential announcement out of the White House next week on Paris withdrawal, and other efforts to dismantle federal US climate leadership, the leadership of our Governors at the state level is more relevant now than ever. Thanks all for your time and consideration, and I hope we are able to chart a path forward on climate collaboration together in the near future.

US Climate Alliance

A Time for Transition & Deployment

- There are a number of new and existing efforts to respond to the Paris Pullback, the Trump rollbacks and most of all, to identify the fastest way to accelerate low-carbon deployment.
- As an anchor partner for many of these efforts, USCA states are looking to map out the best way to realize more outcomes with fewer meetings.
- These overview slides represent our best assessment of what can be done, across multiple activities, and with the right level of transitional funding from climate-focused funders.

Deployment @ Scale

- We are moving from a 30-year era of advocacy to a 30-year era of <u>critical deployment</u> with an eye towards 2050.
- We need a commensurate shift in funding to meet this challenge beginning in 2018 and ramping up from there.
- The bottom line: a 5-10% shift of annual NGO funding for environmental advocacy towards needed deployment scale by both USCA states and effective partner groups.

USCA Outcomes

- Maintain US global leadership standing through multi-state alliance work.
- Bolster critical clean economy businesses and business voices in the US by preserving proven, market-driving policies (carbon pricing etc).
- Counter regressive policies from Washington DC through effective strategies that link states.

<u>USCA Programmatic Overview</u>

USCA currently partners with sub-nationals in the U.S. and abroad in 2 major ways: (1) domestic deployment and (2) international engagement.

- <u>Domestic Deployment</u>
 - USCA member states work with various "loud and proud" climate groups such as the America's Pledge, the Pacific Coast Collaborative and US Conference of Mayors to show how innovative work on clean energy and meeting the Paris climate goals is in fact a driver of job creation and economic competitiveness and make clear to the public that this better/cleaner alternative is accurately portrayed in the news.
 - USCA member states also quietly engage with emerging clean energy states on a bi-partisan basis through individual state partnerships on key topics (eg, transmission and resilient infrastructure financing) and through efforts like the Governors' New Energy Accord, NASEO and ECOS. These efforts are critical for expanding USCA state participation beyond 15 states and to build supportive long-term policy platforms for multi-billion dollar clean economy markets in the US.

What Sub-Nationals & States Need Most: Proven Deployment Expertise

- Both non-U.S. sub-nationals, climate-friendly states in the U.S. and potential U.S. "expansion states" (eg, MI, MT, AL, LA) need technical assistance and deployment expertise but lack the budget capacity to get moving on this work.
- A small handful of technical assistance groups and states do this work well; we need to scale and connect these work streams with willing states.
- U.S. states that are led by GOP Governors want technical assistance from "brands" and experts they prefer, suggesting the need for a neutral *technical assistance* consortium.

I absolutely agree we shouldn't tell states who they can hire (though some might appreciate help with a pipeline of qualified candidates, per your note).

Re: on what issues the candidates would work, there's certainly an option in which we just help them hire whoever they want to do whatever they want on climate. There's also the possibility of us helping to facilitate a capacity building project focused on some particular area of climate policy – in which states interested in that specific area apply to the program after we have set it up with Hewlett. See, e.g., Rockefeller Chief Resilience Officers, in which cities apply to Rockefeller to hire someone to develop resilience strategies. We wouldn't be strong-arming anyone into hiring someone – just helping to make available resources to support USCA-relevant work.

In our next conversation with Hewlett, let's definitely talk with them specifically about their capacity for this – will be good to know if we have to wait until the next funding cycle.



I just checked their CVs and they aren't included so I'm not sure who y'all are reaching out to but I'd like to speak to them too.

Lastly, I talked to Erin from Hewlett yesterday and gave her a quick update on the Alliance. I think we are going to need to avoid a situation where they parse out \$ for each individual hire/piece of work for the Alliance. We could either develop a funding proposal on our own before we hire the ED, or ask them to do that as task #1.

Hi Dan, Charles, Alexander and US Climate Alliance team.

To follow up on our recent phone calls. I want to thank you for your leadership and congratulate you on the successful launch of the "U.S. Climate Alliance" initiative. It is inspiring to see again the swift and sweeping domestic support for the Paris Agreement. Encouragingly, we are seeing early signs that this support is being echoed internationally. If we can sustain this momentum, then we have a real opportunity to mitigate the harm that would otherwise be done from President Trump's ill-advised actions.

I realize that we are in the early days for the initiative but I want to offer our assistance with your effort based on member's needs.

I know that most of states in the Alliance are leaders in climate action efforts, having worked diligently to advance practical climate solutions that deliver real benefits for citizens. Our staff have had the good fortune of working with many in the Alliance states over the years, as we have long sought to be a strong ally and partner to the states. This has included supporting the regional climate initiatives at varying stages through analysis and/or facilitation – including

RGGI, WCI, the Midwestern Accord, and North America 2050, among other projects. I hope that we will have an opportunity to build on these successful collaborations moving forward.

For those of you who we haven't had the pleasure to work with, <u>WRI</u> is an independent global think tank with a history of working on and leading and supporting initiatives with and analyses. This includes our development (and periodic <u>updating</u>) of a <u>roadmap for progress</u> using existing regulatory authorities, which largely was followed by the last administration. It also includes the launch and support of projects like the <u>NDC Partnership</u>, a global initiative that brings together finance and environment ministers from more than 60 countries to help them achieve their national climate commitments and ensure technical and financial assistance is delivered as efficiently as possible.

Dear members of the Under2 Coalition.

In March 2017, we sent an email about a proposal to align the language of the Under2 Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) language with the <u>Paris Agreement</u>'s language. Over the past few months, we have been working with governments that needed approval and have been translating the addendum into multiple languages. We are pleased to announce that we will officially be adding the following addendum to the Under2 MOU.

The Parties to this MOU agree to the following addendum:

The Parties to this MOU aim to strengthen the global response to the threat of climate change by holding the increase in the global average temperature to well below 2°C above pre-industrial levels and pursuing efforts to limit the temperature increase to 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels, recognizing that this would significantly reduce the risks and impacts of climate change.

We have updated the Under2 MOU to include the addendum in multiple languages, which can be found on the website here: http://under2mou.org/the-mou/

By aligning the Under2 MOU with the ambition of the Paris Agreement, we are demonstrating vertical integration of policies and consistency between the national and subnational levels.

We would like to reiterate that the above addendum does not change the guiding principle of the Under2 MOU to pursue greenhouse gas emissions reductions consistent with a trajectory of 80 to 95 percent, and/or 2 annual metric tons per capita, by 2050.

Future signatories and endorsers will be expected to agree to the addendum. Please let us know if you have any questions, and thank you for your bold climate leadership.



Pete, Aimee,

Attached is an updated budget narrative and spreadsheet.

As I reported to Aimee, I met with Vicki Arroyo this morning - it was a good conversation and helped me begin to establish some trust. At the same time, her comments underscored the amount of work and coordination that will be required to move substantive initiatives forward on the domestic front. As I already noted to Aimee, I didn't directly raise the possibility of a secondment because Vicki preempted by saying that she is not in a position to staff other groups, like WASI - based on the conversation I would rule it out as a possibility, but timing wasn't right to raise it.

In light of my conversation with Aimee earlier this week, and the conversation with Vicki, as well as additional thinking on the budget, I have made some changes in the attached:

- 1. I included the domestic policy expert in the budget as an alliance staff person. This role is definitely going to be needed and its not clear that we will get it from Georgetown. Also, I would rather start with it included, than reflected off the budget.
- 2. I included \$100,000 per year for Alliance initiatives, in addition to the \$25,000 for comms. Aimee and I felt that we need to include something in the program budget to work with and can't completely rely the in-kind Rhodium type arrangement.

top line - two year budget - 1.48, 738k in the first year and slightly more in the second. In kind support is approximately 275k per year.

Pete - I suspect that you think this will be a bit of a shock for Hewlett. That said, I think it is difficult to pitch something more scaled back than this. This provides some room for negotiation, but also is a pretty realistic take on a lean budget.

In any case, perhaps best for the three of us to talk today or tomorrow. I am pretty flexible.

Draft Funding Proposal for the United States Climate Alliance

Summary: The U.S. Climate Alliance is a bipartisan coalition of U.S. states committed to upholding the greenhouse gas emissions reduction goals of the Paris Climate Agreement and to continuing to demonstrate leadership on climate change. The Alliance includes 15 members¹ that collectively represent more than 33% of the U.S. population, over \$7.6 trillion in GDP, and nearly 20% of U.S. emissions. The Alliance seeks funding for a secretariat staff and program budget in order to enhance coordination among members, implement new initiatives, and achieve Alliance objectives. Dedicated staffing and program resources will enable the Alliance to develop and execute a strategic plan with clear, ambitious, and measurable goals, implement meaningful new initiatives and partnerships, coordinate policy and legal action, and implement an effective communications strategy.

Participating governors, particularly the Co-Chairs (the governors of California, New York and Washington), will actively support the Alliance and participate in Alliance events, and their staffs will contribute significant in-kind policy and technical contributions. Even with these dedicated resources, however, the Alliance members do not have sufficient resources to support the expanded needs for collective action, including a secretariat team and programmatic budget. Furthermore, a dedicated, professional and impartial staff funded independently will help to establish an important level of neutrality, create buy-in amongst Alliance members, and avoid an outsized influence by one or more states based on funding contributions.

- Communications, Policy, and Administrative Manager (junior-level)

Budget: Attached is a proposed two-year budget, requesting \$1.48 million in funding for the Alliance, along with anticipated in-kind support of \$550,000 . A few notes below:

- This proposal was prepared with the aim of providing adequate resources to stand up a secretariat staff and achieve a core set of objectives, with the understanding that additional growth and resources would be need over time to achieve the full potential of the alliance.
- The proposal makes several assumptions/recommendations regarding in-kind support that will be an essential component to the success of the Alliance
 - The Alliance will work with a modest program budget of \$125,000 per year.
 - UNF, as the host organization, will contribute in-kind policy and technical support.
 - A funder will directly contract with a third party organization to provide additional technical support for modelling, analyses, and reports at \$200,000 per year.
 - Participating governors will provide significant in-kind support through cooperation of governors' senior staff and state agency leadership and staff.

It's go time. But will Trump 'cancel' or concede?

President Trump is finally set to announce whether the United States will remain a party to the Paris Agreement, after months of debate among top advisers and a behind-the-scenes intervention by his daughter, Ivanka Trump.

The final outcome expected this week is unclear. The president's decision, if he has come to one, is shrouded by divergent opinions in the administration. Trump has reportedly told different advisers that he's leaning in different directions. So his verdict stands to stoke consternation in the White House and within agencies, whatever path he chooses.

"No telling," Andrew Light, a U.S. negotiator at the Paris deliberations, said of Trump's direction. "I really don't think you can tell from media reports now where Trump is on this or whether he is in fact telling different people different things."

Axios reported over the weekend that Trump had told "confidants" he would pull out of Paris. The news service also wrote that U.S. EPA Administrator Scott Pruitt will craft an exit plan. The agreement requires a four-year withdrawal process, though there are alternative strategies to exit more quickly. The most controversial of those involves departing the U.N. Framework Convention on Climate Change, a 1992 treaty agreed to by the Senate.

If true, Trump's exit stance appears to be an about-face. Before he left on his nine-day foreign tour on May 19, sources say, he seemed to be leaning toward staying in the agreement.

A U.S. withdrawal promises to upset several U.S. allies, whose representatives Trump met with late last week in Brussels and at the Group of Seven summit in Taormina, Italy. While there, a number of Europeans and the prime ministers of Canada and Japan urged Trump to remain in the deal.

The summit ended with Trump standing in the way of a joint G-7 statement endorsing Paris. Six nations signed it, leaving the United States isolated. But Gary Cohn, director of the White House National Economic Council, told reporters as it was unfolding that the president's position was "evolving" and that he is "leaning to understand the European position."

Cohn, a Democrat and a former Goldman Sachs executive,

seemed to hint during a gaggle aboard Air Force One on Thursday that Trump might opt to stay in the Paris Agreement with a revised emissions pledge that he deemed more "fair" to the United States. That path is a widely discussed alternative to withdrawal.

"The Europeans, as a whole, are pretty much in favor of the Paris accord, but the Europeans as a whole have a much easier standard to abide by than the standard we were left with by the previous administration," said Cohn, adding that it creates an "unlevel playing field."

"So if we have an environmental restriction that's unfair to us and not unfair to every other country, he's not going to go with that," he told reporters.

'Our fate ... our own hands'

Europe is developing legislation to reduce greenhouse gas emissions 40 percent below 1990 levels by 2030. The United States, under former President Obama, committed to cutting emissions 26 to 28 percent below 2005 by 2025. Trump is in the process of dismantling the environmental rules that the previous administration hoped would bring the United States close to its Paris goal.

Still, Cohn's words seem to hint that Trump sees the Paris target as "unfair," rather than the underlying agreement itself. But Cohn might be promoting his own preferences.

Cohn is broadly viewed to support continued involvement in Paris, while Pruitt has strenuously argued against it. Both sides of the internal tug of war have projected that they expect Trump to come down on their side. It's unclear if that's a negotiating tactic or whether they're reflecting what they're told.

Foreign leaders who met with Trump late last week and who were universally in favor of the United States' staying in the Paris accord sounded pessimistic about the president staying in the agreement, and about partnering with the United States across a variety of security and domestic issues.

German Chancellor Angela Merkel said over the weekend that her days shared with Trump convinced her that the European Union must "really take our fate into our own hands."

Apparently stung by Trump's obstruction on Paris and trade, Merkel endorsed "friendship" with the United States and others, but not reliance.

Meanwhile, new French President Emmanuel Macron, who discussed the Paris accord with Trump, bragged about refusing to concede to the polarizing U.S. president even during their handshake.

At home, the decision has divided Cabinet secretaries and White House advisers for months. Key aides and Ivanka Trump have argued in favor of preserving the agreement, to prevent blowback on an array of international issues. Others, like chief strategist Steve Bannon, say the climate pact is economically harmful. At one point last month, Ivanka Trump interceded in a legal dispute about the ability to weaken U.S. emissions goals.

U.S. is 'Mr. Hyde'

U.S. climate advocates, meanwhile, are divided in their reading of the tea leaves for this week's announcement. They tend to agree that whatever Trump proposes would likely weaken U.S. climate action.

Paul Bodnar, the former White House National Security Council climate chief, said it would be a "slap in the face" to world leaders if Trump spent days soliciting their views and then returned to Washington to announce the opposite decision.

"That would be kind of a double helping of insult," he said. Bodnar suggested it could mean either that close U.S. allies failed to persuade Trump or that he'd had his mind made up prior to the meeting. Alden Meyer, strategy director at the Union of Concerned Scientists, said the chance of a "stay" decision is diminished now that the G-7 meeting is in the rearview mirror.

"I'd always thought if Trump was going to stay in, why not do it at the summit and take the praise and the credit of other leaders?" he said.

Whatever Trump's decision, it comes as the European Union and China prepare for a bilateral summit this Friday that will include an agreement on climate change. It also comes as Merkel prepares for July's meeting of the Group of 20, which she had hoped would endorse Paris. That could be complicated if Trump pulls out.

The European Union, China and Canada launched a joint initiative last week aimed at keeping major economies working on climate change outside the UNFCCC.

Bodnar said that a U.S. retreat from the Paris accord would create space for other countries to lead.

"What's pretty clear, and of course encouraging, is the degree of unanimity in the rest of the world that they're going ahead," he said

The U.S. negotiating team under Obama helped enable this, Bodnar said, when it insisted on politically binding architecture that encourages joint action. He compared the United States to the 19th-century novella "Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," in which the good doctor ends up occupying the same body as the evil Hyde and starts trying to limit his damage.

"When we're Dr. Jekyll, we're working with the international community to create a structure that can withstand us when we turn into Mr. Hyde," he said. "The encouraging thing is that I think the structure's going to stand."

Subject: Virginia executive directive news and misc updates

Dear state leaders.

We wanted to let you know about some exciting news out of Virginia today--

Virginia Governor Terry McAuliffe signed Executive Directive 11, which instructs the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality to begin the process of promulgating a regulation to reduce carbon emissions from power plants. The regulation is to include provisions to ensure that it is "trading-ready" to allow for the use of market-based mechanisms and the trading of carbon dioxide allowances through a multi-state trading program; and establish abatement mechanisms providing for a corresponding level of stringency to those imposed in other states with such limits. The proposed regulation will be presented to the state Air Pollution Control Board by no later than December 31, 2017 for consideration for approval for public comment.

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Federal Updates:

Nominations

Independent agency nominations (updated 5/16): President Trump nominated Neil Chatterjee and Robert Powelson to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC). FERC lacks a quorum necessary to issue rules, but the confirmation of Chatterjee and Powelson would provide FERC with a quorum. Chatterjee is an aide to Mitch McConnell and Powelson is a Pennsylvania regulator and current president of the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners. Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee Chairwoman Murkowski has pledged to move the nominees through her panel "as quickly as possible."

Senior agency/department appointments (updated 5/16): Rachel Brand's nomination to be Associate Attorney General is <u>likely to be considered</u> the week of May 15. If confirmed, she would manage the Justice Department's Environment and Natural Resources Division (ENRD) among other responsibilities. Jeff Rosen's nomination to be Deputy Transportation Secretary is <u>likely to be considered</u> the week of May 15. John Sullivan, the nominee for Deputy Secretary of State, <u>said</u> that the US would be "best served" by remaining in the Paris Agreement at his

confirmation hearing on May 9. <u>Daniel Simmons</u>, formerly of the American Legislative Exchange Council, will serve as the Department of Energy's Office of Energy Efficiency & Renewable Energy Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary. Dan Brouillette <u>has been nominated</u> to be the Deputy Secretary of Energy. Andrew Wheeler, former Republican Environment and Public Works Committee staff, will <u>likely be nominated</u> to be Deputy EPA Administrator, but it could be several weeks until he is officially nominated.

Budget/Spending

Trump budget (updated 5/16): The White House is <u>reportedly</u> attempting to halt some Department of Energy loan guarantees and grants that it zeroed out in its <u>budget blueprint</u>. However, the Department <u>told</u> its program offices that it would honor all funding commitments for "previously obligated" grants and cooperative agreements. Over 1,000 firms <u>sent</u> a <u>letter</u> urging House and Senate appropriators to strengthen the Energy Star program, which had also been targeted for elimination in the blueprint. The administration is supposed to release a more detailed budget that will contain line-by-line spending for agencies in May. Budget proposals are the <u>first step</u> in a lengthy process that determines federal spending. Congress will next consider a budget resolution to determine the total level of discretionary funding – the size of the pie – and then, through the appropriations process, determine program-by-program funding levels (the slices of the pie).

Executive Action

Withdrawing from Paris Agreement (updated 5/16): Despite earlier indications that the Trump administration intended to make a decision on whether to withdraw the US from the Paris Agreement before President Trump traveled to the G-7 summit in Italy at the end of May, the administration has now decided it will make that decision after the summit. 12 Governors sent a letter to President Trump on May 3 urging the President to keep the US in the Paris Agreement. A particularly contentious issue in the discussion around possibly withdrawing appears to be dueling interpretations of Article 4.11 of the Paris Agreement and whether the US can replace its Paris promise to cut emissions with a less ambitious goal. The White House counsel office believes that the US cannot replace the promise with a laxer goal, as does one of the drafters of the Agreement.

CPP and new source rule litigation (updated 5/16): The parties <u>submitted</u> briefs to the DC Circuit on May 15 on whether the Clean Power Plan should be remanded to the agency or held in abeyance. Administrator Pruitt has <u>recused</u> himself from the Clean Power Plan litigation because he was involved in the litigation when he was Oklahoma attorney general. The DC Circuit on April 28 <u>granted</u> the Trump administration's request to hold the CPP litigation in abeyance for 60 days as EPA reviews the CPP following the energy independence executive order.

Fairbanks Declaration (added 5/16): Secretary of State Rex Tillerson and seven foreign ministers from Arctic nations signed the Fairbanks Declaration on May 11. The nations agreed to set a collective target for reducing black carbon emissions between 25-33% below 2013 levels by 2025.

Executive orders (updated 5/16): The Office of Management and Budget <u>issued</u> a <u>memo</u> the week of May 8 detailing requirements for the section of the <u>energy independence executive order</u> that instructs agency heads to review all regulations, guidance documents, and policies that burden the development of energy resources. President

Trump also signed an executive order on <u>review of designations under the Antiquities Act</u> on April 26 and on implementing an America-first offshore energy strategy on April 28.

Regulations

Regulatory process (updated 5/16): The Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee will vote on four regulatory reform pieces of legislation the week of May 15: Regulatory Accountability Act, the REINS Act, the Midnight Rules Relief Act, and the Small Business Regulatory Flexibility Improvements Act. The REINS Act and Midnight Rules Relief Act have already passed the House; the Regulatory Accountability Act and the Small Business Regulatory Flexibility Improvements Act have not. The House has passed a series of regulatory reform bills, including the HONEST Act, the SCRUB Act, the Regulatory Integrity Act, and the OIRA Insight, Reform, and Accountability Act, that still await action in the Senate.

Eight Republicans on the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee <u>sent</u> a <u>letter</u> to EPA's Regulatory Reform Task Force under <u>the enforcing the regulatory reform agenda executive order</u> urging that the Task Force focus on rules that rely on either the social cost of carbon or co-benefits to justify the cost burdens on the economy.

Agencies

EPA's Endangerment Finding: The Texas Public Policy Foundation filed a <u>petition</u> on May 1 with EPA, <u>arguing</u> that the endangerment finding is invalid because EPA did not submit the endangerment finding to the Science Advisory Board for peer review. In 2009 litigation, the DC Circuit declined to find the failure to submit the endangerment finding to the Board was fatal. This petition follows a petition for reconsideration of the endangerment finding that was <u>filed</u> by the Competitive Enterprise Institute and board members of the Science and Environmental Policy Project in February. The New York Times has <u>reported</u> that Administrator Pruitt has informed the White House and Congress that he will not seek to reverse the 2009 endangerment finding because such a move would likely be overturned by the courts. Pruitt argued against including language calling for a repeal of the endangerment finding in the <u>energy independence executive order</u>; the executive order did not include language on the endangerment finding.

EPA website (updated 5/16): On April 28, EPA's climate change website <u>was removed</u>. The following week, EPA <u>removed</u> even more mentions of climate change from its website. The content will be changed to reflect President Trump's energy independence executive order and updated language about the Clean Power Plan. EPA said it would follow agency guidelines on archiving online content from the Obama administration. The City of Chicago is now <u>hosting</u> EPA's climate change information on its <u>website</u>.

Continued waiver for California under the CAA: According to a report, the administration appears to have postponed plans to rescind California's currently in-effect Clean Air Act waiver, but Administrator Pruitt has declined to answer questions on whether he would allow EPA to maintain its waiver. The waiver allows California to set more stringent vehicle air pollution standards than EPA; the CAA requires EPA to grant California the waiver with few exceptions, and waivers have been previously granted in all but one circumstance. Rescinding a waiver has never been attempted before and would likely be subject to legal challenges.

Fuel Efficiency Standards (updated 5/16): EPA Administrator Pruitt has <u>asked</u> California to participate in the review of federal vehicle emission standards. In the <u>letter</u> requesting California's participation, Pruitt did not mention California's waiver under the Clean Air Act. The White House has <u>told</u> automakers that it will seek to broker an agreement with California to avoid a patchwork of vehicle standards across the country as the automakers have cautioned against aggressively rewriting the standards. EPA and NHTSA filed a <u>notice of intent</u> to reconsider the Final Determination of the midterm evaluation of GHG standards for model year 2022-2025 cars and light trucks in March. EPA and NHTSA will now determine by April 1, 2018whether the previously established GHG standards for model years 2022-2025 are still appropriate. April 1, 2018 was the previous deadline for completing the midterm review.

Grid study: <u>Travis Fisher</u>, who has previously been <u>critical</u> of support for renewables, will reportedly lead the Department of Energy's <u>60-day study</u> of how renewable energy policies may be accelerating the decline of baseload coal and nuclear power plants and how that may impact grid reliability. The study may be a pretext for walking back incentives for renewable energy sources in favor of conventional sources of energy.

Methane

BLM methane rule (updated 5/16): The US Senate <u>voted down</u> a Congressional Review Act resolution to overturn the <u>BLM's methane regulation</u> by a vote of 51-49 with Republican Sens. Collins (ME), Graham (SC), and McCain (AZ) crossing the aisle to join every Democratic Senator to oppose the motion. However, the Interior Department has indicated that it will take steps to "suspend, revise, or rescind" the rule. Democratic Senators Heitkamp (ND) and Manchin (WV) wrote a <u>letter</u> to the Department of Interior urging that "significant modifications to the rule" be pursued.

New source methane rule: On April 18, EPA announced that it is conveying a proceeding for reconsideration of the agency's new source methane rule in response to the oil and gas industry's petitions for reconsideration of the rule. EPA claimed that the petitions raised at least one objection to the rule - alternative means of emission limitations and inclusion of low-production wells - that arose after the comment period or was impracticable to raise during the comment period. Attorneys at environmental non-governmental organizations argue that the American Petroleum Institute commented on alternative compliance mechanisms and that EPA sought comment on low-production wells and thus reconsideration of the rule is not appropriate. The Justice Department filed a motion to hold litigation over EPA's new source methane rule in abeyance on April 7 and other parties to the litigation have weighed in on the motion; parties have not filed opening briefs in the litigation.

Existing source methane rule: EPA withdrew an information collection request to oil and natural gas producers that was to inform the development of a rule to regulate methane emissions from existing sources after the Governor of Kentucky and Attorneys General from Texas, Alabama, Arizona, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Montana, Oklahoma, South Carolina, and West Virginia requested EPA take this step. The Attorneys General from Massachusetts, California, Illinois, Maryland, Maine, New York, Rhode Island have written to EPA Administrator Pruitt to urge EPA to reconsider the decision to withdraw the information collection request or otherwise explain how EPA intends to fulfill its legal obligation to address methane leaks that are endangering public health and welfare.

Congress

EPA's GHG regulatory authority: On January 24, Rep. Gary Palmer introduced the <u>Stopping EPA Overreach Act</u> (H.R. 637), which would strip EPA of its authority to regulate greenhouse gases (GHG) by defining an "air pollutant" under the Clean Air Act as excluding GHGs, and would invalidate the CPP and EPA's new source methane rule. It currently has 116 Republican cosponsors. House Speaker Paul Ryan included this legislation in the House Republican's 2016 campaign platform, <u>A Better Way</u>. A vote has not yet been scheduled on the legislation. EPA Administrator Pruitt has <u>hinted</u> that he would like to see Congress address the issue of whether carbon is an air pollutant under the Clean Air Act.

Tax reform: Treasury Secretary Mnuchin <u>indicated</u> that the administration is not planning to move tax reform legislation and an infrastructure package together. The White House released its <u>blueprint</u> for tax reform on April 26. Amid concerns that the wind protection tax credit may be targeted for repeal in tax reform legislation, the wind industry is <u>highlighting</u> that the vast majority of wind investment (86% of wind farms) is in Republican districts.

Omnibus energy legislation: The Chair and Ranking Member of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee announced on May 3 that they intend to try to pass major energy legislation again. Last Congress's energy legislation in the Senate included provisions on energy infrastructure, energy efficiency, grid security, and natural gas exports. The legislation passed the Senate and a less ambitious package passed the House; but the Senate and House were not able to reconcile the differences in the two bills before Congress adjourned.

Renewable energy legislation (updated 5/16): Senator Wyden (D-OR) introduced the Clean Energy for America Act, which would increase tax incentives for clean energy as emissions are lowered. Power plants emitting 35% less carbon dioxide than the national average could qualify for incentives under the plan. Zero emission facilities could receive the maximum of either a production tax credit or an investment tax credit. Transportation fuels could qualify if their life-cycle emissions were at least 25% below the US average and zero or "net negative" emissions could receive the maximum production tax credit. 22 Senators that caucus with the Democrats are co-sponsors.

Oregon Senator Jeff Merkley <u>introduced</u> legislation to achieve 100% zero carbon power by 2050. The measure would support energy efficiency; improve gird reliability; include changes to the tax code related to oil, coal, and gas; and permanently extend tax credits for qualified electric and hybrid vehicles.

Climate Solutions Caucus (updated 5/16): 12 members of the Caucus (6 Democrats and 6 Republicans) have reintroduced the Climate Solutions Commissions Act to establish a 10-person commission to review "economically viable" policies to reduce GHG emissions. The bipartisan - there are an equal number of Republicans and Democrats - Climate Solutions Caucus explores policy options that address the impacts, causes, and challenges of climate change.

Infrastructure package (updated 5/16): The Trump administration will <u>unveil</u> a statement of "principles" within a month on its \$1 trillion infrastructure plan with the expectation that lawmakers will work on the package during the third quarter of 2017. The plan will be paid for with \$200 billion in direct federal funding and public-private partnerships and possibly tax reform and sale of some government assets.

This MOU becomes effective on the date of the last signature of the Parties and is expected to continue through December 2020, though the parties will revisit it on an annual basis and this MOU may be modified or amended if the Parties agree in writing.

Nothing in this MOU shall require, or be deemed to require, Georgetown University to take any action or omit to take any action that would jeopardize Georgetown's tax-exempt status under Section 501c(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States, Georgetown's federal corporate charter granted by the United States Congress, accreditation of its Georgetown University Law Center by the American Bar Association, or participation by Georgetown or its students in federal student assistance programs. Governing Law

This Memorandum of Understanding ("Memorandum") represents a statement of intent by the States of California, New York, and Washington, in their capacities as Co-Chairs of the US Climate Alliance ("Co-Chairs"), and Georgetown State-Federal Climate Resource Center ("Georgetown Climate Center") of Georgetown University Law Center, each a "Party" and together, the "Parties") to collaborate in the achievement of common objectives as described and on the basis outlined below.

WHEREAS:

- •The US Climate Alliance ("Alliance") is a group of states and Puerto Rico, represented by their Governors, whose members intend to collaborate closely to demonstrate the impact of existing and forthcoming policy actions to reduce GHG emissions.
- •Each Alliance member agrees to:
 - •Implement the goals of the Paris Agreement to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by at least 26-28 percent below 2005 levels by 2025 at the state level;
 - •Track and issue annual collective progress reports prior to meetings of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change; and
 - •Accelerate new and existing policies to reduce carbon pollution and promote clean energy deployment at the state and federal level.
- •Through regular collaboration at the senior staff level, Alliance members will accomplish their objectives by:
 - •Coordinating on federal policy engagement aimed at preserving the right of states to protect the environment and support clean energy deployment;
 - •Collaborating on state policy development where possible to maximize the impact of individual state action;
 - •Attracting new jobs and investment by demonstrating a commitment to climate leadership; and
 - •Helping sustain global momentum on climate through strategic international engagement and by demonstrating domestic progress despite likely federal inaction.

- •Alliance members have identified a number of potential priority policy focus areas, including but not limited to:
 - •Renewable energy and energy efficiency policy ambition review
 - •Social cost of carbon
 - •Reduce high intensity pollutants
 - •Green Investment Banks
 - •Protect federal vehicle emissions and fuel economy standards
 - •Support innovative utility regulations
 - •Align building codes
 - •Sustain threatened federal energy initiatives

The Co-Chairs seek a neutral, impartial third-party organization to provide Secretariat Support Services to the Alliance. The Georgetown Climate Center of Georgetown University offers such a platform and has a proven track-record of serving leading states which were instrumental in the founding of the Center with philanthropic support in 2008. With offices at the Hall of States to house new Alliance staff to be hired and selected in close partnership with Co-Chairs, Georgetown offers an opportunity to serve the needs of the Alliance and co-chairs without a predetermined agenda and without branding recognition.

Georgetown will provide the Alliance with a full suite of administrative and project management capabilities and services in an efficient manner, including but not limited to: routine operations, human resources, accounting, finance, IT, auditing, other back-office and logistical support, fiduciary services, grant and sponsored programs capabilities, budget and other project administration, and the opportunity to initiate contracts with individuals and firms.

Georgetown University is a 501(c)(3) organization established in 1789. In the spirit of the new republic, the university was founded on the principle that serious and sustained discourse among people of different faiths, cultures, and beliefs promotes intellectual, ethical and spiritual understanding. We embody this principle in the diversity of our students, faculty and staff, our commitment to justice and the common good, our intellectual openness and our international character.

The Georgetown Climate Center (GCC) is one of more than a dozen Centers & Institutes based at Georgetown University Law Center. GCC was established by and for leading states with support from philanthropic funders in 2008 and has offices at Georgetown Law as well as the Hall of States where the Alliance staff will be housed.

NOW THEREFORE the Parties intend as follows:

•Secretariat Support Designation

The Co-Chairs designate Georgetown Climate Center as the organization responsible for providing Secretariat support ("Secretariat Support") for the Alliance.

•Relationship between the Secretariat Support Organization and the US Climate Alliance

As the Secretariat Support Organization, Georgetown Climate Center will provide neutral, unbiased, and unbranded back-office host support functions as outlined above to the US Climate Alliance. The US Climate Alliance will be an independent project of Georgetown Climate Center. The Alliance will develop its own logo and branding guided by the direction of the Co-Chairs and the Alliance Staff. Alliance Staff will be interviewed and selected for hire by the Alliance Co-Chairs in coordination with Georgetown, and will be employed by Georgetown University working under the supervision of the executive leadership of the Georgetown Climate Center. Georgetown will oversee background and immigration checks and onboarding, and provide additional staff time for secretariat services.

Support Functions

In its role as the Secretariat Support, Georgetown shall provide administrative support and fiduciary services to the Co-Chairs and the Alliance in the following ways:

•Administrative Support

- •Georgetown Climate Center shall provide administrative support for the Alliance, including providing physical office space for Alliance staff and access to IT resources as required, including computers, printers, fax/copy machines, telephones, and other office resources required to conduct the regular business of the Alliance.
- •Georgetown University will provide Human Resources support for Alliance staff, as staff of Georgetown University.
- •Georgetown shall provide all financial and budget support for the Alliance.

•Financial and Fiduciary Services

- •As the Alliance's fiscal sponsor, Georgetown may be called upon to help solicit, and will receive and expend funds as needed to support the Alliance.
- •Georgetown will vet all major supporters before receiving the funds based on a Partner Due Diligence process agreed upon between the Alliance and Georgetown. Georgetown reserves the right to refuse any funds from donors that do not meet these requirements.
- •In support of the Alliance, and in partnership with Co-Chairs and Alliance Staff, Georgetown's support will include budget development, creating a prospects list, helping vet potential funders, executing sponsorship agreements, issuing acknowledgement letters, generating and submitting donor reports with assistance from Alliance members and staff, and facilitating vendor/consultant contracts and payments.
- •In addition to the fundraising-related fiduciary duties detailed above, Georgetown will help to support the Alliance's overall fundraising efforts, including the development of fundraising strategy.
- •Budgets will include Georgetown's 15% IDC rate for nonfederal grants to support overhead costs associated with providing financial and fiduciary services to the Alliance and to serve as fiscal sponsor.
- •Budgets will also include line items for Alliance staff hired through Georgetown, additional GCC staff time required for Secretariat duties (in coordination with Co-Chairs), travel and events, consulting services, equipment and supplies, and communications materials and support as noted below as part of proposals crafted with the Co-chairs.

Hey Folks. Attached is a Best Practice template to help guide you in responding and sending me your state's plain English Best Practices document. They goal is to your Best Practices back by next Friday (August 25). In addition to the template, I have put together a questionnaire to serve as a baseline of knowledge for the incoming secretariat to have and it will also serve as a way to illustrate for us what states are doing what, guide us to see synergies, and connect the dots.

The best practices for each state should be organized by the five pillars the USCA workgroup developed in July 2017: Finance, Power Sector, Transportation, Efficiency, Natural Resources.

The USCA Best Practices exercise serves two purposes:

- A. External/Plain English developing a state-by-state compendium of USCA state programs, organized by the five pillars that can be used as a stand-alone document and be the meat of any annual report used by the USCA. These programmatic descriptions should be written to be easily digestible while still being substantive (see example document 'NY USCA BP draft.external').
- B. Internal/Detailed Program Information In addition to the outward facing purpose, the Best Practice exercise will also build out the substantive policy details needed for USCA states to collaborate and share programmatic detail on each states own initiatives. These responses, again organized by the five pillars, should be detailed and technical, identifying the current problem, the intervention strategy, barriers/opportunities, and metrics for performance evaluation.

Hey friends:

Here's a doc to help explain a possible event and talk it over with your senior teams. Pls let us know response. This is what was described on last week's call and that I promised to get you. I will also get out a series of questions and format for best practices in next day.

When: September 20, 2017 at UN Climate Week in NYC (location TBD)

Who: (depending on schedules) USCA Co-Chairs: Gov. Brown (CA), Gov. Cuomo (NY) and Gov. Inslee joined by other Alliance governors (possibly: Hawai'i and others)

Press Interest: First official governor led USCA event announcing first annual USCA Climate Report during UN Climate Week to ensure the USCA doesn't cede any of the states' leadership on climate to other groups such as We Are Still In. The goal of the event would be to demonstrating the group intends to not only continue individual commitments to reduce GHG but, more importantly, announces that the USCA states are on target to hit their Paris commitments and that the states will collaborate to advance and expand GHG/carbon reduction in the US. Further that the USCA states are committed to staying united with the rest of the international community on combating climate change and meeting Paris goals.

Proposal: USCA Governors Announcement of NewUSCA Climate Report & USCA Initiatives for 2018

USCA was created to provide a framework for state's committed to achieving emissions reduction goals set forth in the Paris Climate Agreement. USCA Governors announce a series of products and initiatives for USCA states to work collaboratively on and advance emission reduction goals. By doing so, USCA is establishing its credibility as a bi-partisan cooperative and leaves the door open for other states to participate. USCA states are stepping up where the federal government has stepped back. States have a large degree of independence in crafting their own energy and environmental policies, and have made enormous strides in building their own clean energy economies without leadership from the federal government. Creating an annual report gives USCA the transparency and credibility needed in the face of the waning US Government presence in the climate change discussion.

By creating a report: USCA frames all follow-up or additional announcements within the progress report as everything we are doing or going to do is about progress on our numbers. We are grounded by a report showing real, demonstrative state progress in the commitment to the Paris Agreement AND the effectiveness of state policies, which speaks to this is a substantive Alliance not a PR exercise. The report will establish a way to benchmark the original 14 USCA states and leaves the door open to bring other states into group.

Content of First Annual USCA Progress Report: (see attached slides for background)

- 1. Where We Are: Establishes the 2005 baseline for carbon reduction and shows the trends of the 14 USCA states reducing carbon through 2015 towards Paris goals.
- 2. What Are We Doing: Essentially recrafting state climate plans and/or USCA individual state best practice strategies that show how the USCA states have achieved improvements from 2005 onward. Yes are numbers are good right now, but it's important to understand USCA states' policies that have moved the needle. (best practice book/website)
- 3. Where We Are Going: given the policies USCA states already have in place, USCA can credibly project that USCA is on target to meeting Paris commitments by 2025 (can also compare and contrast with non-alliance states). In addition as the slide below shows, USCA states have outpaced non USCA states in greenhouse gas reductions while at the same time out pacing them in GDP growth, showing the media/public that good climate policies do NOT hurt the economy and may in fact grow it faster.
- 4. Wait, Wait...We're Not Done: for the first report, USCA could announce the sectors we intend to collaborate on: Finance, Power Sector, Transportation, Efficiency, and Natural Resources. The USCA states are looking for deliverables to announce under those issue areas that would be ready by September event. By developing and working collectively in these sectors, USCA states will further build on and speed up positive trend lines of greenhouse gas reduction.

Possible announcements framed within or by the Climate Report:

- Formalizing USCA and Creating a Standard Emission Inventory: In order to ensure that Alliance states' emissions reductions are reported and tracked in the most effective way possible, the USCA will be supported by a secretariat out of Washington, DC
 - By joining USCA, members states are committing to reducing their greenhouse gas emissions by the level originally submitted by the United States -- at least 26-28 percent below 2005 levels by 2025.
 - USCA States will be required to submit yearly reports tracking their progress and mapping out their projections to meeting the 2025 goal, using a framework provided by the secretariat to ensure that projections are congruent to one another. USCA will offer technical assistance to all member states to ensure that the methodology and tracking is consistent amongst the member states.
- **USCA Best Practices Guide:** An expanded state-by-state and/or sector-by-sector compendium of the policies currently in place (i.e. a comprehensive document of policies in the *What We Are Doing* summaries in the USCA Climate Report)
- **Technical Assistance University:**Create a shared platform for states to share and offer technical assistance to one another. NYS, VT and MA are already on the same platform so we are looking into who to take that to other states.
- Economic Impact Assessment: Each state could provide a summary of clean energy investments anticipated over the next 3 years that will continue driving reductions in carbon emissions. (Angela's idea) Or we could take an aggregate numbers of years since 2005 (or any other date) and state this is what have done to date. Or something in between (we need to work through this point) This should include both public-sector financed and private-sector financed investment. The breakdown will include at least the following four categories: (1) renewables, (2) energy efficiency, (3) transportation, (4) buildings. We will sum up those investments for an announcement that would focus on the following: "The Climate Alliance states are collectively committing to a goal of \$X billion or the Climate Alliance states have collectively invested xxx billions in the last decade in clean energy investment. These public and private sector investments further drive the carbon reductions necessary to achieve the goals of the Paris Agreement while also providing significant economic development and job creation opportunities for our states."
- **USCA Green Bank:** May not be ready by September but the states are discussing ways for states to partner/leverage financing and investment tools using the green banks that are already in existence.
- Interstate Resilience Finance Effort--Pooling Risk: This could be potentially HUGE but may not be ready by September but need to work it through for possible November announcement. Right before transition, WH team wrote this report and had a bunch of insurance companies make commitments on supporting this work.



US Climate Alliance Secretariat Support Memorandum of Understanding August XX, 2017

This Memorandum of Understanding ("Memorandum") represents a statement of intent by the States of California, New York, and Washington, in their capacities as Co-Chairs of the US Climate Alliance ("Co-Chairs"), and Georgetown State-Federal Climate Resource Center ("Georgetown Climate Center") of Georgetown University Law Center, each a "Party" and together, the "Parties") to collaborate in the achievement of common objectives as described and on the basis outlined below.

WHEREAS:

Georgetown University is a 501(c)(3) organization established in 1789. - •In support of the Alliance, and in partnership with Co-Chairs and Alliance Staff, Georgetown's support will include budget development, creating a prospects list, helping vet potential funders, executing sponsorship agreements, issuing acknowledgement letters, generating and submitting donor reports with assistance from Alliance members and staff, and facilitating vendor/consultant contracts and payments.
- •In addition to the fundraising-related fiduciary duties detailed above, Georgetown will help to support the Alliance's overall fundraising efforts, including the development of fundraising strategy.
- •Budgets will include Georgetown's 15% IDC rate for nonfederal grants to support overhead costs associated with providing financial and fiduciary services to the Alliance and to serve as fiscal sponsor.
- •Budgets will also include line items for Alliance staff hired through Georgetown, additional GCC staff time required for Secretariat duties (in coordination with CoChairs), travel and events, consulting services, equipment and supplies, and communications materials and support as noted below as part of proposals crafted with the Co-chairs.

Communications

•Georgetown Climate Center may be called upon to provide short-term communications support for the Alliance and bring onboard additional dedicated Alliance communications staff and contractors to support external communications, including support for public relations, press releases, printed materials including signs and banners, website design, management and updating, as well as social media support.

•Oversee Alliance Staff and obligations to states and funders

The Alliance Staff will be responsible for managing policy and substantive questions related to the Alliance and will provide the day-to-day coordination and support for the Alliance, at the direction of the Co-Chairs and Members, and in coordination with Georgetown Climate Center management and project funders. Alliance staff will provide substantive, logistical, communications, fundraising, and other support in partnership with states, funders and partners supporting substantive work:

- •Policy and substantive questions related to the Alliance. Policy and substantive priorities and initiatives of the Alliance will be directed by the Alliance Co-Chairs and Members, with support from the Alliance staff. In some cases, other Georgetown staff may be invited by the Co-Chairs to provide support on policy questions related to the Alliance where they have substantive knowledge and expertise to bring to bear. Coordinate work of state agency staff implementing policy work plan.

Ensure the Alliance has a public message ready in response to critical news events and work with Cochairs on messaging and products in anticipation of key events like Climate Week, COP23 and other negotiations, etc.
- •Emissions tracking. Coordinate emissions and commitment tracking with research/analytical partners, and coordinate with groups doing complementary work.
- •Policy Support. Coordinate collaboration among states through work groups and support/resource them either directly or in partnership with other think tanks, non-profits and other organizations that serve as convenors and/or support substantive subnational work. Manage relationships with other organizations providing communications, research, production or other services to the Alliance as part of its scope of work.

•Funding. Facilitate communications with project funders and manage the development of proposals and documentation necessary to secure operating resources for the Alliance.

(Betting that you know these organizations better than anyone – just wanted to send along in case useful.) She will be out here later this month and I'll be sure to have her come meet you on a day you are up in Sac to say hi. She's currently in Schumer's office but I think planning to move to CAP soon.

Also if I can be permitted a thumb on the scale...STRONGLY recommend UNF over Georgetown Climate Center as the right host for this endeavor. Much more credibility/existing relationships with UN and international system, and a stronger overall institutional structure to support the secretariat (in terms of comms, fundraising, hosting capacity, etc). I like the GCC folks but they have historically been more focused on the domestic legal side, which isn't at issue here. I worked with UNF a lot during my international development goals days and they are just great folks, and have good relationships on both sides of the aisle in Congress (we used to do a lot of stuff with Graham, but other Republicans too), and their whole structure is basically supporting medium-term special-purpose projects like this one...plus the UN angle. U.S. has stated it will 'not renegotiate the Paris accord' but will review its terms

NEW YORK—Trump administration officials said Saturday the U.S. wouldn't pull out of the Paris Agreement, offering to re-engage in the international deal to fight climate change, according to the European Union's top energy official.

The shift from President Donald Trump's decision in June to renegotiate the landmark accord or craft a new deal came during a meeting of more than 30 ministers led by Canada, China and the European Union in Montreal.

"The U.S. has stated that they will not renegotiate the Paris accord, but they will try to review the terms on which they could be engaged under this agreement," European Commissioner for Climate Action and Energy Miguel Arias Cañete said.

The White House did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

White House senior adviser Everett Eissenstat unveiled the U.S. plan, according to an official at Saturday's gathering, as Ottawa, Beijing and Brussels accelerate their joint effort to minimize the fallout from a potential U.S. withdrawal from the Paris agreement.

Still, Washington's move may prove a pyrrhic victory for Paris Agreement champions. The U.S. is expected to significantly reduce its ambition to curb greenhouse-gas emissions, which would be in line with Mr. Trump's goal of clinching "fairer terms," the official said.

- Media Advisory & Op-Ed: We're looking for sign-off on these items ASAP. Delay will risk having fewer reporters attend or call-in into the Monday event and means the op-ed will likely land in a smaller publication then the NYT.
- Embargo Timing: NYT and Bloomberg have confirmed they will work on stories. North Carolina plans to issue their advisory Monday morning around 10 or 11 am. Gov. Cooper's comms staff said that they don't mind if the national story is broken before they announce it in their state press, giving us flexibility on our embargo timing for the national stories.
 - 12:01 am ET: Nexus recommends that the embargo be lifted at 12:01 am ET; this enables the stories to go live online early enough to be in the morning news roundups, and to drive other press to the event. This will also enable the story

- to run in print on Monday.
- 2 pm ET: We can also arrange for the embargo to be lifted at 2 pm ET, right before the press conference, and urge the NYT to run the story in print on Tuesday, but our concern is that we will shorten our own news cycle.
- More Detail on the NC Release: NC's comms team has asked that the mention of NC be downplayed in national press materials, so we will remove it from the sub headlines, but keep it in the opening paragraph of the press release. We have already told the NYT and Bloomberg of the update to ensure that their articles are accurate, but, at the request of Gov. Cooper's team, did not frame it as a major news item.
- <u>Comms Package</u>: Please continue adding your edits to the press release (quotes, etc) so that we can finalize the document. Nexus is adding the interview availability tracker and talking points today.
- Social Media: We did not have a chance to discuss social media on the call yesterday but flagging that social media language is in the comms package.
 Hawaii: are you still planning to have a Facebook live link and someone there to film it?
- Attendees: Some international folks have caught wind of the event and Minister McKenna of Canada has requested to attend if that is ok with everyone. We'll continue to let you know if we hear from any additional foreign leaders requesting to join.



Proposal for the United States Climate Alliance

Summary: The U.S. Climate Alliance is a bipartisan coalition of U.S. states committed to upholding the greenhouse gas emissions reduction goals of the Paris Climate Agreement and to continuing to demonstrate leadership on climate change. The Alliance includes 15 members¹ that that collectively represent more than 36% of the U.S. population, over \$7.6 trillion in GDP, and nearly 20% of U.S. emissions. The Alliance will establish a secretariat staff and program budget to implement new initiatives, achieve Alliance goals and objectives, and coordinate member states collective efforts to actively reduce climate change contributing factors.

Pete, Aimee,

Attached is an updated budget narrative and spreadsheet.

As I reported to Aimee, I met with Vicki Arroyo this morning - it was a good conversation and helped me begin to establish some trust. At the same time, her comments underscored the amount of work and coordination that will be required to move substantive initiatives forward on the domestic front. As I already noted to Aimee, I didn't directly raise the possibility of a secondment because Vicki preempted by saying that she is not in a position to staff other groups, like WASI - based on the conversation I would rule it out as a possibility, but timing wasn't right to raise it.

In light of my conversation with Aimee earlier this week, and the conversation with Vicki, as well as additional thinking on the budget, I have made some changes in the attached:

- 1. I included the domestic policy expert in the budget as an alliance staff person. This role is definitely going to be needed and its not clear that we will get it from Georgetown. Also, I would rather start with it included, than reflected off the budget.
- 2. I included \$100,000 per year for Alliance initiatives, in addition to the \$25,000 for comms. Aimee and I felt that we need to include something in the program budget to work with and can't completely rely the in-kind Rhodium type arrangement.

top line - two year budget - 1.48, 738k in the first year and slightly more in the second. In kind support is approximately 275k per year.

Pete - I suspect that you think this will be a bit of a shock for Hewlett. That said, I think it is difficult to pitch something more scaled back than this. This provides some room for negotiation, but also is a pretty realistic take on a lean budget.

Global Climate Action Summit September 12-14, 2018

The California Vision

In September 2018, California will host the Global Climate Action Summit, convening over 1,500 representatives from subnational governments, businesses, investors and civil society, and accompanied by national governments (Non-party actors). The Summit, hosted by Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr. in his last of 16 years holding the office will showcase the State's domestic and international climate leadership, and highlight the groundswell of action happening across all types of actors across the world that can be used to catalyze further efforts at the national level.

Leading by example, California will use the Summit as a launching pad for meaningful, innovative climate announcements, and will call upon national governments to use the outcomes of the Summit to leverage their own climate ambition. The Summit will be the first time a US State has taken the initiative of hosting an international climate change conference with the direct goal of supporting the international United Nations process to address climate change. The messages from the Summit will carry from San Francisco, California, to the UN General Assembly hall in New York, to the 24th UN Framework Convention on Climate Change, where countries should commit to enhancing their climate targets by 2020.

Overview

The Summit will demonstrate the immense groundswell of innovative, ambitious climate action from non-Party actors around the world and the low-carbon economic transformation that is already underway, providing examples of entities achieving emissions reductions while maintaining economic growth and highlighting the opportunities presented by a low-carbon economy. Non-Party actors are helping nations achieve their Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) — and will likely help them overachieve their NDCs from here to 2020, when Parties are expected to enhance the ambition of these targets.

In this context, the Global Climate Action Summit will serve as a platform for **evaluating** progress to date, **showcasing** existing success stories, and **redoubling** action by non-Parties, to be captured in a range of outcomes that will in turn be leveraged to catalyze greater ambition from national governments in the context of the Facilitative Dialogue that is to take place at COP24 in Poland. Ideally, Parties would then come out of the Facilitative Dialogue ready to make a political statement surrounding their processes to enhance the ambition of their NDCs by COP26 in 2020.

Recognizing the early state of planning for the event, envisioned outcomes of the Summit include:

- 1. An analysis quantifying the aggregate GHG reductions resulting from the actions of non-Party actors.
- 2. A report compiling a number of case studies that best represent the Summit's low-carbon transformation narrative;
- 3. An announcement of the most ambitious new commitments from non-Party actors, to be selected through a competitive process in the lead up to the Summit;
- 4. A high-level "Call to Action" letter with recommendations to be sent to Heads of State and Ministers ahead of the Facilitative Dialogue, with messaging about the need to come to COP24 ready to commit to enhancing NDC ambition by 2020.

Summit Leadership

Governor Brown as the host of the Summit has extended invitations to co-Chairs representing key non-Party stakeholder groups. UNFCCC Executive Secretary Patricia Espinosa has accepted the invitation to co-Chair the Summit, providing an important link from the non-Party actors back to the UNFCCC negotiation process, particularly the Facilitative Dialogue that will take place at COP 24 in 2018. Governor Brown has also extended an invitation to Michael Bloomberg, who was originally invited to co-Chair the Summit, along with Governor Brown, by Christiana Figueres in 2016. Governor Brown is also looking to invite an additional co-Chair from the private sector.

Steering Committee

The Summit will harness and aggregate the collective impact of climate action from states and regions, cities, businesses, investors, and civil society. The steering committee is, therefore, comprised of the major representative coalitions across these constituencies. The role of the steering committee is to support the inclusive participation of their respective constituencies and to help shape the structure, content and successful outcomes of the Summit. The steering committee will also provide structure and guidance for the Working Groups and will report on progress made. Mission 2020 has been asked by California to convene and facilitate the Steering Committee meetings, help coordinate inputs and outputs for the summit, and guide the performance of the Working Groups in service of the Summit and its outcomes.

Operating Rules

The Steering Committee will meet monthly for the remainder of 2017, thereafter intensifying its schedule towards September 2018. Steering Committee members will be expected to commit their organizations to leading one of the working groups and/or otherwise making a significant contribution to the Summit, as well as to coordinating with the Logistics, Communications & Funding Team. There will likely be 2 in person meetings of the Steering Committee in 2017, the first to take place on the margins of NY Climate Week in September and the second on the margins of COP23 in Bonn.

Steering committee members will strive to support the vision of Governor Brown, as the host of the Summit, and will make recommendations to the Summit host, as needed. The Steering Committee should come to its recommendations by consensus, and when this is not possible, all points of views will be elevated to the Summit Host, for consultation with the co-Chairs.

Next Steps: Organize a working call on this topic on a monthly basis with two in-person meetings - in Bonn in November and then in Washington in Q1 2018

Purpose -- Share different work streams we are working on so we can be coordinated on reports being planned, meetings taking place, work in progress, gaps we identify, communication plans being developed for the near-term and longer-term.

Main highlights from discussion:

- Aggregation is not enough where are tipping points and common narrative coherent story —need a common process
- If US analysis is done, can there be one report it needs to have a broad narrative that include benefits to make it more useful. We should also have some focus on transformational examples, what others could do to inspire action.
- Any report to be produced needs to be started soon to be on time to deliver at the CA Summit in September
- Need to focus on implementation progress and not just new commitments. Tracking progress is important
- Need funders to collaborate and coordinate; best to have one integrated process
- Can this group be governed collectively through common work streams proposed and coordinated funding to support the work?
- Need to ensure communication is well integrated with any reports or methodologies presented
- How can we collectively maximize our impact and messaging at the two upcoming events and in the longer term?

Ongoing Work—Needs to be refined based on input from participants.

Bloomberg: Funder of many initiatives - Global Covenant of Mayors, America's Pledge, focused on US as a case study on how to do the work and communicate political and narrative element; interested in global piece as well.

Cal EPA: Engaged with America's Pledge, and how it could be replicated to rest of the world.

I agree with Vicki. I'm beginning to see a bit of "commitment fatigue" from our leadership, and the last thing we want to do is dilute the importance of our efforts and the interest of our leadership with yet another commitment.

We felt WASI aligned directly with the Global Covenant and Under 2 MOU commitments we had previously made, which is the main reason Mayor Dyer decided to move forward. That said, he did ask how this differed from the other commitments we've made and why there seemed to be competing commitments to achieve the same outcomes.

The difference I see with WASI is the multi-sector approach, not just municipal governments, but counties, states, businesses, academia, and other nonprofits. I think this is a great approach to unite all of these actors, but would agree that aligning with the other widely accepted protocols would add value and be more beneficial for cities.

Thanks Erin. Yes - I'm on Garrett's email chain too, so helpful to see some other city perspectives weigh in on WASI ahead of Monday's meeting. Commitment-fatigue is real!:) I'm still fuzzy on what WASI wants to be (and I think they are still figuring this out too) ... 1) the high level political drumbeat, or 2) facilitator of collaboration between cities, businesses, universities, etc make & achieve goals, 3) or both / something else. To the extent that WASI's strategy ends up feeling aligned with the Climate Mayors mission, then my hope would be that WASI would think of and look to Climate Mayors to essentially be the "cities pillar" of their multi-sector effort (but with us remaining separate and independent) so that we avoid creating another separate but overlapping network of cities coordinating on climate.

Thanks Sarah. Garrett reached out to several USDN folks in advance of the WASI meeting as well, as WASI had requested input on whether they should ask cities to make yet another set of commitments. For whatever this is worth, I'll share with you (et. al) the feedback I gave him...

My opinion is that WASI should avoid asking cities to make new commitments – it's exhausting and the marginal value seems increasingly negligible at this point. It would be better for them to just reference existing groups like Climate Mayors or Global Covenant. If they are interested in commitment and accountability, Global Covenant is a particularly good partner, as they have clear steps regarding inventorying, goal setting, and reporting, as well as accountability measures in place via CDP. From a Climate Mayors perspective, I wouldn't want WASI to become a "competing" group with a similar but slightly different message. Better to aggregate than differentiate IMO.

I will spare folks the background on the evolution of this (although happy to discuss by phone), but as I'm sure many folks saw, the effort was previewed on Friday in a NYT piece, available

here: https://www.nytimes.com/2017/06/01/climate/american-cities-climate-standards.html, that features Mayor Bloomberg as the driving force behind the effort.

I think at this point, all three of us are teed up to participate, and possibly OR and a few other states. I'm not sure if others have been on the email chains, but there has been quite a bit of last minute back and forth and changes (for example, AGs were going to be included in the letter but were then told they could not be included).

Increasingly my sense is that this initiative and ours are being conflated, and that we have some basic differences of opinion in the right ways to move each of our efforts forward. As such, I think it might be in everyone's better interests to have our two initiatives continue on parallel and complementary but separate tracks. I also know many Governors are having signing fatigue and may not be inclined to sign on to yet another initiative. I want to see what you all think and whether you agree. If so, I'd be fine with conveying that decision to the letter organizers first thing tomorrow AM. We should probably also then reach out to the other states who may have signed on so that we are moving in lock step.

I agree with Vicki. I'm beginning to see a bit of "commitment fatigue" from our leadership, and the last thing we want to do is dilute the importance of our efforts and the interest of our leadership with yet another commitment.

We felt WASI aligned directly with the Global Covenant and Under 2 MOU commitments we had previously made, which is the main reason Mayor Dyer decided to move forward. That said, he did ask how this differed from the other commitments we've made and why there seemed to be competing commitments to achieve the same outcomes.

The difference I see with WASI is the multi-sector approach, not just municipal governments, but counties, states, businesses, academia, and other nonprofits. I think this is a great approach to unite all of these actors, but would agree that aligning with the other widely accepted protocols would add value and be more beneficial for cities.

Commitment-fatigue is real!:) I'm still fuzzy on what WASI wants to be (and I think they are still figuring this out too) ... 1) the high level political drumbeat, or 2) facilitator of collaboration between cities, businesses, universities, etc make & achieve goals, 3) or both / something else. To the extent that WASI's strategy ends up feeling aligned with the Climate Mayors mission, then my hope would be that WASI would think of and look to Climate Mayors to essentially be the "cities pillar" of their multi-sector effort (but with us remaining separate and independent) so that we avoid creating another separate but overlapping network of cities coordinating on climate.

Thanks Sarah. Garrett reached out to several USDN folks in advance of the WASI meeting as well, as WASI had requested input on whether they should ask cities to make yet another set of commitments. For whatever this is worth, I'll share with you (et. al) the feedback I gave him...

My opinion is that WASI should avoid asking cities to make new commitments – it's exhausting and the marginal value seems increasingly negligible at this point. It would be better for them to just reference existing groups like Climate Mayors or Global Covenant. If they are interested in commitment and accountability, Global Covenant is a particularly good partner, as they have clear steps regarding inventorying, goal setting, and reporting, as well as accountability measures in place via CDP. From a Climate Mayors perspective, I wouldn't want WASI to become a "competing" group with a similar but slightly different message. Better to aggregate than differentiate IMO.

Ok - a readout:

Call was me, Next Gen (Lashof, Aaron Burgess, Franz H) and Elan. They're interested in a bipartisan governors event at NGA in RI highlighting state climate leadership and commitment to Paris. Next Gen is "alliance agnostic" as to whether Alliance, WASI, etc.

I said that if climate event is focused on governors it should be under Alliance frame (in RI and otherwise), and the good reasons for letting the Alliance be the primary assembly for govs commitment to Paris. This was accepted. But if it was to be broader event with governors and mayors and biz and univs etc, I said we could welcome them to it. Told them there was continued uncertainty about whether we'd have a public event related to alliance at the NGA (a bit of a fib), but that Id circle up with are team. And besides we are planning to assemble staff.

All agreed that:

- 1) we should use the NGA gathering as a forcing event to recruit governors for the Alliance (or continue to, as it were), and WASI will continue to recruit Govs too;

I do think we are missing an opp to highlight the alliance at NGA. But don't know how we move NY off of where they are. I think we should try to tee up new signers so we can announce them, and reference our senior staff gathering (eg "meat on the bones") just before or during NGA weekend...

Real U.S. Leadership on Climate Change - the United States Climate Alliance National Governors Association (NGA) Side-Event

Location: Providence, Rhode Island, TBD on margins of NGA Summer Meeting Date: Friday, July 14 or Saturday, July 15, 2017

Context: Following the Trump Administration's June 1, 2017 announcement of their intent to pull the U.S. out of the Paris Agreement, multiple efforts have galvanized demonstrating continued commitment to the Agreement and ambitious climate action. The leading efforts are:

- <u>United States Climate Alliance</u>: United States Climate Alliance (USCA) is a bipartisan group of states committed to upholding the objectives of the Paris Agreement on climate change within their borders, by achieving the U.S. goal of reducing carbon dioxide emissions 26–28% from 2005 levels by 2025 and meeting or exceeding the targets of the federal Clean Power Plan. The Alliance also forms a forum for its members to further develop and strengthen their existing Climate Action Plans through sharing of information and best practices. The 13 members of the Alliance as of June 29, 2017, made up 30.6% of the U.S. population and 35.9% of U.S. GDP as of 2016, and accounted for 18.2% of U.S. carbon dioxide emissions in 2014.
- WeAreStillIn: We Are Still In (WASI) is the broadest cross-sectional platform of the US real economy in pursuit of climate action and clean energy. Over 2,000 strong and growing, the platform will work to coordinate climate action across sectors, rally allies and resources to existing in-sector efforts, and provide assurance to the international community that leaders from across America's state houses, city halls, board rooms, and college campuses stand by the Paris Agreement and are committed to meeting its goals.
 9 Governors are currently committed to WASI.
- The Under2 Coalition is a diverse group of governments around the world who set ambitious targets to combat climate change. Central to the Under2 MOU (Memorandum of Understanding) is an agreement from all signatories to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions 80 to 95 percent below 1990 levels, or limit to 2 annual metric tons of CO2-equivalent per capita, by 2050. A total of 176 jurisdictions spanning 36 countries and six continents have signed or endorsed the Under2 MOU. Collectively, the Under2 Coalition represents 1.2 billion people and \$28.8 trillion in GDP equivalent to 16 percent of the global population and 39 percent of the global economy.

Purpose: Membership in these groups is somewhat overlapping but also not completely aligned, yet there is ample opportunity to recruit additional Governors to join one or more of the existing initiatives and capitalize on the Governor's convening at the NGA. The purpose of the side-event at NGA is to provide a forcing event to compel action from Governors to join USCA one or more of the initiatives.

Messaging: We intend to frame the NGA side-event broadly around States evincing the mantle of US climate leadership, with a focus on having them join the USCA. With this topline message, Governors can step forward and speak positively to the topline message from the unique perspective of their State. In regards to Pennsylvania, Tom sat down the Governor Wolf this morning to make the ask, and Wolf is pretty adamant about not joining. It is his view that it will have a negative effect in his state as the bigger deal he makes about it, the more the leg. will come after him. Basically his climate plan is "the quieter the better." We are rethinking our PA strategy today, and will be on the phone with some environmental partners in the state this afternoon.

- On numbers, yes we are only counting city population in states that aren't members of the Alliance or WASI (e.g., Chicago), which is how we get at the population number. Companies and universities do not count for this purpose.

Thanks for taking the time for today's call, it was very productive from our standpoint. We've captured a summary and next steps from the discussion here - please let us know if you have other items or questions or if we've missed anything here.

- WASI and USCA will work together to recruit new members for both organizations
- Events that are with governors only should be USCA
- Events with broader coalitions should be WASI
- For the NGA side-event, first preference is to recruit a bipartisan group of governors to join the USCA and do a joint press conference during NGA, giving Govs a platform to explain briefly what their state is doing to meet their share of the US NDC and goals of the Paris Agreement. Recruitment priorities are PA, CO, MD, LA, MT, NV, NC.
- For a potential second event, WASI will look at looping in the leaders of business that are part of WASI to do a joint press conference with governors and potentially some mayors. Recruitment priorities are CEO of CVS, possibly Musk. Lineup could be Gov. Riamando, CEO of CVS as new joiner, Elon Musk, Mayor of Providence, University.
- All groups are going to continue recruitment efforts and we will touch base again next week to see where we are at.

(As a side-note we had a productive conversation with Bullock's staff this afternoon and are hopeful that they will be able to join. Should have more info next week)

- * Media Advisory & Op-Ed: We're looking for sign-off on these items ASAP. Delay will risk having fewer reportersattend or call-in into the Monday event and means the op-ed will likely land in a smaller publication then the NYT.
- * Embargo Timing: NYT and Bloomberg have confirmed they will work on stories. North Carolina plans to issue their advisory Monday morning around 10 or 11 am. Gov. Cooper's comms staff said that they don't mind if the national story is broken before they announce it in their state press, giving us flexibility on our embargo timing for the national stories.
- * 12:01 am ET: Nexus recommends that the embargo be lifted at 12:01 am ET; this enables the stories to go live online early enough to be in the morning news roundups, and to drive other press to the event. This will also enable the story to run in print on Monday.
- * 2 pm ET: We can also arrange for the embargo to be lifted at 2 pm ET, right before the press conference, and urge the NYT to run the story in print on Tuesday, but our concern is that we will shorten our own news cycle.
- * More Detail on the NC Release: NC's comms team has asked that the mention of NC be downplayed in national press materials, so we will remove it from the sub headlines, but keep it in the opening paragraph of the press release. We have already told the NYT and Bloomberg of the update to ensure that their articles are accurate, but, at the request of Gov. Cooper's team, did not frame it as a major news item.

Alexander,

I share your anger and frustration on the process and rollout here; it's totally justified. And, I apologize for not having given you the courtesy of a direct heads up. We were not actually included on the email you forwarded so as you can imagine have been exchanging some strongly worded emails of our own with the Bloomberg team. I say that not to absolve myself or to undercut my apology, but just wanted you to be aware of that.

As you noted we've been talking about this with Bloomberg for some time and have had concerns which you and I have discussed. I think your team also knew this announcement was a possibility--I know for example that Nancy flagged it for Maria on a call the other week. As is often the case we ended up having to make a quick call here about whether or not to jump and ultimately decided to make sure this train has all the wheels as it leaves the station and that we have some ability to ensure that it does NOT interfere with Alliance plans. For a number of reasons including the ones Dan mentions, I think we can actually make this work to our advantage for the Alliance on a number of fronts.

Everyone is looking to the Alliance for leadership first and foremost. I don't think this announcement does anything to undercut that. Everyone I have spoken with agrees that states, more than cities, businesses, etc. are the ones that have the mantle of leadership now in the face of national abdication. We should be confident and secure in that. That said, folks are not going to wait for us if we can't get our act together. We have to make the Alliance something meaningful or we will cede the ever-shrinking white space here. Others aren't waiting around for us to figure out what we want to be when we grow up. My intention with this Bloomberg initiative, as it was with We Are Still In and the half dozen other things we've been pulled into since the Paris announcement, is to make sure we are engaged to the extent appropriate to avoid ceding control and territory for the Alliance.

What does undercut us, more than Bloomberg or any other group can, is our inability as co chairs to agree on basics like support structure, work program, etc. I have been and still do really look forward to our time together in RI to hash or some of these important questions so we can build the Alliance up to its full potential. I hope we can have a reconciliatory drink(s) in Providence on me as part of that.

Tomorrow morning at 9:30AM ET, Mike Bloomberg and California Governor Jerry Brown will announce a new partnership, "America's Pledge" on climate action, to respond to the Trump Administration's announced withdrawal from the Paris Agreement.

A new project website will go live tomorrow morning here: www.americaspledgeonclimate.com.

Our America's Pledge effort will involve select signatories of the landmark "We Are Still In" declaration published last month in response to the White House's announcement on Paris, and will also include a wide range of leading academic researchers, technical experts, international lawyers, and others to develop and help communicate a new kind of report on U.S. subnational and non-state ("non-Party") climate action, in alignment with and consistent with the goals of the Paris Agreement. The

Rocky Mountain Institute and the World Resources Institute will jointly lead an inclusive analytical effort supporting America's Pledge, with the involvement of a broader set of stakeholders to be announced in the coming months.

America's Pledge will quantify the aggregate impact of subnational and non-state actor climate and energy commitments on projected future emissions, tracking against both a business-as-usual (BAU) trajectory of projected GHG emissions under likely Trump Administration policies, and the U.S. Nationally Determined Contribution of 26-28% reductions against a 2005 baseline by 2025. Of course, we also hope America's Pledge will help raise the bar for additional city/state/business climate action to drive down U.S. emissions in the coming years. This November at COP23, Bloomberg and Brown, along with other U.S. governors, mayors, and business leaders, will compile and showcase the climate commitments of U.S. subnational and non-state actors, and we'll work on a more detailed report for 2018 as well.

We anticipate collaborating with many of you in this open-source effort in the coming weeks and months, and look forward to discussing next steps as together we help shape what some are calling a new kind of "societally determined contribution" in alignment with the Paris Agreement.

For now, we'd love your help amplifying tomorrow's announcement. As of tomorrow morning at 9:30AM ET, please feel free to blog, tweet, pitch reporters on interesting follow up stories, etc.

Overall Updates

2017 C40 Satisfaction Survey

Thanks to those who have responded to the (brief!) satisfaction survey attached here. For others, please do respond if you can as soon as possible.

Deadline 2020 and Paris-Compliant Planning

Many of you have inquired about the next steps and in particular on tools to assess how local plans compare to a 1.5 degree standard. Following the release of Deadline 2020, C40 has developed a 1.5 degree program that will be led by Simon Hansen. The first element of this program is work with 5 Steering Committee cities this year to assess existing plans, identify emission reduction pathways, and deliver TA to develop a draft 1.5 plan.

Given strong interest in the US and Canada, Simon and the research and planning teams are exploring how to maximize engagement with current resources and what could be done with additional resources/partnerships. More news on this in the coming days.

Reinventing Cities

At the Mexico City Summit, Mayor Hidalgo highlighted Reinventing Paris, a program that redeveloped 22 public sites into highly sustainable uses through a design competition and community engagement. She also announced plans for a global Resilient Cities competition, where sites across multiple C40 cities are offered for redevelopment to incorporate zero carbon retrofits and community priorities.

Mayor Hidalgo will be reaching out soon to C40 mayors to gage interest. Helene Chartier, who ran the Paris program, will be staffing this for C40 out of Paris.

Compact of Mayors/Global Covenant of Mayors

The merger of the Compact of Mayors and Global Covenant of Mayors continues and is likely to be announced in mid- to late-March at Brussels. In parallel with the merger, funding from the EU is starting to flow to expand TA to to move toward compliance.

In addition, C40 continues to provide targeted TA for North American cities working on one or more element of compliance. If you are one of those 6 cities, you should be hearing from Max Jamieson or Malcolm Shield about the TA. If they haven't been in touch or if you have questions, please let me know.

US-Specific Updates

There are LOTS of conversations underway among cities, city networks, NGOs, media and more about the climate outlook in the US under President Trump. There is also strong consensus around the need to act, the critical leadership role mayors can play, and the ability of cities and other "sub-nationals" to step forward as the federal government steps back. While C40 is global, the circumstances here seem to warrant a country-specific effort and the management wants to support US cities. Look for more details and requests for input soon on a US strategy. For now, here are some immediate updates.

US Coordination Call

US Conference of Mayors Activity

Thanks to everyone who joined the dinner, groups photos, or social media effort to keep climate on the radar during the USCM Winter meeting last month. This was short notice and not an official USCM effort, but it seemed to garner good media coverage and excitement among the mayors.

Coalitions and Networking

- An informal coalition of city networks and city-supporting NGOs (participants pasted below) has met in person and by phone 3 times in the last month. Kevin Taylor from WWF reached out to C40 and the other groups active before and after Paris around cities and climate to assess post-election plans. The initial meeting was followed by two calls, one on city-specific research led by Sam Adams from WRI and a second on overall collaboration and communications. Attached below FYI are the summary notes from the first meeting. Notes from the research and collaboration meetings are coming soon, so I will pass those along.
- On yesterday's call, this group also discussed developing a "War Room" strategy that builds on capacity of the partner organizations to coordinate efforts. We are happy to engage from C40 and will send more updates soon.
- C40 was also invited to a DC meeting of a "Kitchen Cabinet" of national and global NGOs focused on (participants pasted below). This group was convened by the Union of Concerned Scientists, OxFam International, NRDC, and WRI to coordinate around short- and medium-term strategies in advance or/reaction to Trump administration and Congressional actions on international climate policy. I'll share more information from this group as I am able.

Rapid Response Messaging and City Resolutions

In anticipation of Trump pulling out of the Paris Agreement or similar actions, Josh and Brooke Russel from C40 Communications helped develop the attached rapid response approach. This is still draft, but want to share FYI. The intent here is to start a conversation around shared and effective messaging, so your feedback and comments are welcome.

Josh Harris from C40 Communications will be reaching out to your communications contacts to discuss this further.

The rapid response document also includes a "city resolution" that was drafted after inquiries from several cities. Sharing this FYI and interested in feedback.

2018-2020 INTERNATIONAL POLITICAL STRATEGY

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT AND DEPLOYMENT

This analysis has been authored by Liz Gallagher, outgoing Climate Briefing Service (CBS) Director. It could not have been written without the confidential input of many non-governmental experts and serving officials that engage on international climate politics. It has been strongly informed by the insights and expertise from the global team of CBS.

PURPOSE

Since Paris, the key thought leaders and practioners have frequently gathered to work through what can be expected from this new post-Paris chapter. This proposition aims to articulate and codify some of these rich discussions into a simple, long-awaited political strategy. It focuses on the 'what' not the 'how'. Not all organisations and individuals will agree entirely with these priorities and outcomes, as such this proposition is one offering.

BOUNDARIES

There are many elements of climate action defined as 'international'. In order to draw a clear line, this proposition focuses on how to use the international drumbeat (ambition mechanism) that Paris defined to help deliver collective ambition.

Whilst the connections between other agendas like finance, transport and biodiversity are important, these are well established and as such will not be the focus of this proposition. The 'international' for our purposes will include:

International talks in 2020 – culminating in UNFCCC, but will draw upon Agenda 2030 and the Conference for Biological Diversity (CBD) Major plurilateral meetings like G7 and G20 Bilateral/regional meetings between leaders

THE CHALLENGE AND OPPORTUNITIES

Whilst 2020 is the culmination of this new chapter, the beginning will take place in 2018. Global emissions peaking by 2020 demands pushing on every door by everyone. The Paris Agreement is an effective lever to wedge open the door, it has political traction. But this new chapter is different to the last. **The politics of regime building we undertook ahead of Paris are fundamentally different to the politics of ambition we face now.** 2020 is multi-faceted – it is not just about targets, timetables or text. The regime is in place – this new chapter is about **connecting reality on the ground to the politics and strengthening the regime to reinforce collective ambition.** This new chapter will be defined by:

Containment versus Ambition – despite the strength and resilience of political support, the Paris Agreement is still vulnerable and demands our attention to defend and uphold it. However, demonstrating the logic of the Paris Agreement is key to its long-term defence. It is, therefore, essential to create a reinforcing cycle in which change on the ground builds confidence and results in new collective commitments.

- Deeper advocacy whilst keeping climate change on the radar of world leaders will be important for political momentum, many of the daily decisions will fall into the hands of unelected bureaucrats. Inertia and resistance from unelected technocrats will become a significant hurdle. Influencing these constituencies is challenging and requires a step change in how non-state actors interact with officials and leaders to help deliver accountability and action.
- Climate as mainstream versus climate as by-product in many countries and across many plurilateral venues climate is shaping, not chasing the geopolitical priorities. In some developed countries, like Germany, US, France and Poland, it is becoming a (sometimes divisive) political issue. This has benefits as it can elevate the debate, but it can reinforce the more abstract and intangible nature of the agenda. The politics of populism means we must relate climate to everyday lives, while keeping it at the top table, where it deserves attention.
- Known unknowns the Paris Agreement and the new chapter we face open up a Pandora's box of challenges. We are only managing a third of the climate challenge. We can no longer ignore some of the security and governance risks of climate impacts or the potential for crash mitigation approaches. The international governance systems are not fit for purpose to address these issues which are becoming more probable and intense. In addition, the reactions by different actors to these issues also has the potential to divide and create opposition within our community.
- No one in charge whilst the US federal government did not singlehandedly deliver the Paris Agreement, they did take responsibility for delivering much of the climate diplomacy choreography required to attain success. Whilst new leaders are emerging, there is no single leader helping to choreograph success in 2020, as such higher transaction costs will result from a more distributed leadership.
- Democratise the details the rules that govern the Paris Agreement will need to be in good part developed by 2018. To ensure honest, as opposed to creative accounting, these decisions must be democratised, taken out of the hands of bureaucrats and governments, leveraging the wealth of experience of non-state actors.
- Trump second term many within the climate leadership community have priced President Trump into what they expect for 2020. In addition, much of the roll backs that President Trump has induced will not take effect until 2025. As such, the psychological blow to global climate confidence of President Trump winning a second term is highly problematic and will require significant contingency planning by the global climate community.
- Fragmented and diverse actors importantly, one of the biggest changes is that after Paris, the climate community has reverted to business as usual and is more fragmented as a result. This proposal aims to provide a common thread to harness our collective activity, augment it and channel it to achieve political change.

WHAT'S AT STAKE?

2020 is make or break for the Paris Agreement – it is the real moment of truth when investors and business will judge the sincerity of countries' commitments made in 2015. 2020 will help to build resilience into the fragile but mutually reinforcing momentum between government signals and action by business and investors.

Paris proved that when the political conditions are right, international climate diplomacy can create a powerful ambition dynamic that raises the bar for everyone as countries step forward together. Whilst 2020 is the end point of this new chapter, the beginning is 2018, when a range of international events align to create a sense of urgency and confidence in delivery.

This new chapter is also a moment to get serious about the 'known unknowns' of climate change. By 2020 we can **no longer ignore the non-linear and disruptive nature of climate impacts and climate policy**. Without effective governance reforms, these issues can be misappropriated by populist and incumbent forces risking peace and stability.

If no active political alignment and momentum is channelled ahead of 2020:

International leaders won't feel pressure or have political cover to step forward together to make clear progress.

Incumbent forces will work to unravel the universality of the Paris Agreement and it will stop being an effective lever for change domestically.

The investments and resources currently deployed amongst non-state actors and civil society will not be channelled into political change and ambition.

Progress made on the ground will not be captured and reinforce confidence amongst governments to continue to raise ambition.

FRAMING 2020

Underpinning a winning strategy is a new frame. This new frame upgrades the level of complexity in how we manage a global conversation on the challenge and the solutions. This needs to complement and build on the Paris narrative that climate action makes economic sense, but it must go one step further. It must focus on the social dimensions and benefits of climate action. Climate action must be seen as the by-product of the reforms citizens care about. And critically, the story must move beyond the benefits of action, towards the consequences of inaction, making climate impacts relevant to daily lives.

An important component of this new chapter should help create confidence in the disruptive potential of climate impacts and solutions. Moving from incremental towards transformational mind-sets will be vital to ensure ambitious decision-making. And finally, we should cement the multi-layered complexity of international climate action – no longer is this the domain of governments. All parts of society must lead – from individuals, cities, companies, investors and governments.

WHAT CAN BE GAINED BY 2020?

The richness and complexity of what needs to be achieved by 2020 has been captured, synthesised and focused into the key priorities that can guide our collective work. There are two main goals for 2020.

1. Group of developed and developing countries from the G20, progressive governments and non-state actors feel confident to step forward together to enhance ambition to keep on track to deliver Paris.

Not all countries will want to or be able to step forward on ambition. But by 2020, if additional political momentum is actioned, it will be possible to quantify emissions reductions by a critical mass of countries, but this will not and should not be the whole story of 2020.

If successful, 2020 should also mark a turning point in structural change in the global economy in key sectors – a factor that is difficult to quantify. For example, carbon risk pricing on new infrastructure. It is also important that countries take the next step in making Paris a reality by undertaking 2050 plans that cement a layer of confidence into the investment community and spur on national and sectoral transformation. Again, this is a challenge to quantify.

By 2020, we still will not have closed the gigatonne gap, but we must be able to demonstrate quantifiable difference between promises in 2015 and the reality in 2020/2030, complemented by demonstrating structural change in the economy. This means 1.5°C must still be possible and 2°C more probable, though not necessarily secured[1].

Importantly, what counts as 'ambition' by 2020 is that it can both be quantifiable and qualitative but crucially it must be **new and additional to the promises made in 2015 and countries NDCs.**

Framing these new and additional promises as benefits can help to bring the reality of these promises to life and resonate beyond the climate community. For example: energy bill savings pledges; green spaces coalition; efficient public transport; energy independence; access to sustainable energy promises; saving our harvests pledges; save the Arctic etc.

QUANTIFIABLE: Not all actors signed up to Paris will do more than their Paris commitments. However, some countries and non-state actors can do more without significant real-economy effort – for example, they may have announced additional policies not captured in their 2015 NDCs. Whilst this may look simple on the surface, persuading these countries to rebase their NDCs to reflect the reality of what the atmosphere sees is not going to be easy. Governments like to give themselves a flexibility and not tighten the ratchet too much, as such **this approach requires significant diplomatic choreography.** Some (non-exhaustive) examples of these policies could include:

Coverage – Non-CO2 gases like HFCs phase down, methane emissions reductions, black carbon reduction measures Sectoral targets such as deforestation, coal phase down deadlines, soil degradation reductions Additional climate finance contributions by a range of actors, including but beyond developed countries Honesty in accounting – ensuring that credible and robust accounting standards are clear and implemented

QUALITATIVE: many of the substantive decisions required to be compatible with the Paris Agreement may not be sufficiently mature or quantifiable by 2020. However, capturing these is vital as it reinforces confidence in the political and real-economy momentum by investors and business. Some (non-exhaustive) examples of these policies could include:

Internalising Paris – for example 2050 plans can help governments to comprehend how to reorient their economies towards sustainable development, carbon pricing; disclosure of climate risk; greening portfolios by MDBs

Long-term targets demonstrating structural reform - for example 100% RES by 2050.

2. Robust governance reforms address 'known unknowns' of climate action and impacts and spur on urgency agenda

At present, at the international level, we only manage around a third of the climate challenge. The discussions on mitigation of greenhouse gas emissions from the energy sector are mature, whilst taking action on other sectors like agriculture or addressing unmanageable climate impacts is far more complex and often marginalised. Endeavours are being channelled into addressing 'crash' mitigation governance, but frighteningly, our approach to addressing the impacts of climate change is undervalued and immature. This is in stark contrast to the gravity of such impacts, the rising probabilities of them taking place as emissions do not decline rapidly enough and as climate sensitivity becomes more fragile.

If these issues are continuously side-lined and unmanaged by the international climate community, they can be **hijacked by our opposition** and we risk dividing the unity and momentum built up around ambition through our ignorance and polarised positions on controversial issues like negative emissions. Constructing the political conditions for mitigation success could be impossible when **radicalised and polarised voices** of allies are raised. Decarbonising could be compromised as the political bandwidth to deal with <u>multiple compound resource shocks</u>, now becoming a likely reality in future, is reduced.

What's more, communicating the costs of inaction and the various 'known unknowns' can act as a significant catalyst on ambition, refreshing the call for urgency, ensuring our political and economic leaders understand the gravity of the challenge as opposed to the economic costs and opportunities. In particular, unveiling where the burden of risks associated with climate impacts fall, can animate greater accountability between citizens and their local and national governments, consumers and companies.

By 2020 we will need to have created the political demand to address and manage 'known unknowns', for example, knowing who to mobilise, what to ask for, when and where to do so and how. This issue must evolve and become more mature, as such a phased approach is more desirable.

The first phase is to identify the risks and increase the literacy amongst the international climate community on the risks and possible solutions, for example, risks could include: the tensions between food security, crash mitigation approaches and biodiversity; addressing how we identify, monitor and manage tipping points and compound resource risks; addressing some of the legal and governance uncertainties regarding supply chain risks; loss and damage etc.

Ultimately, addressing the global aspects of this challenge is a decision to reach consensus at the United Nations – including the UN Security Council, but also other plurilateral peace and security institutions. **Creating the demand for such reform** requires the following:

Ensuring sound analytical evidence base on these issues – identifying the risk probability and understanding who is being burdened with the risk can help to provide agency to new constituencies

Engaging climate impacted sectors to improve literacy and political agency to become stronger forces for ambition and actions Ensuring well informed governance reform proposals manage disruptive change

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN IN PRACTICE?

Countries[2]

The Paris Agreement demonstrated that when a handful of countries step forward together, others follow, creating a critical mass. Understanding which countries can trigger and multiply others matters. The selection criteria can include those where political influencing machinery exits; their ease/ability to do more; sectoral heavyweights; diplomatic must haves; hosting Presidencies; potential disruptive threat.

Priority countries are the 'usual' suspects with France; Germany; India; China; Brazil; and the US. However, in addition to these countries UK; Argentina; Mexico; South Africa; Indonesia; Saudi; Japan; and Canada, have qualities that can help lift collective ambition.

There are other coalitions of countries like the **High Ambition Coalition and the Climate Vulnerable Forum** that act as a surging force for ambition that require support to be fit for purpose to address the challenges of the new chapter.

These countries are particularly important to the first goal outlined in the political strategy. The governance reform to address some of the major risks associated with climate action and impacts will demand country support, a detailed agenda for action will crystallise as the political strategy matures.

Sequencing and Alignment

There are a number of opportunities and risks in this new chapter (see Figure 1). In particular, the Presidencies of both the G20 and G7 are held by Saudi Arabia and the US respectively. From 2018-2020 key elections will take place and could have implications for the national interest debate on climate change ahead of 2020. What is evident is that 2018 is building up to be a critical year in kick starting the politics of 2020. The California Summit for non-state actors; the IPCC 1.5 Assessment; the Climate Vulnerable Forum Summit and the Facilitative Dialogue in 2018 all help to provide moments to galvanise momentum.

These moments must be shared if 2020 is to deliver robust outcomes. As the international climate community becomes more diverse and fragmented, **coming** together around key moments will help connect the reality on the ground to the politics and keep up that reinforcing momentum that builds confidence amongst our leaders, investors and business.

The sequencing and choreography of how to achieve 2020 must begin now. The crucial dynamic is to create a vanguard of actors that are willing to do more, and invite governments to support them. Setting up this conditionality helps to keep pressure on governments, but demonstrates momentum and intent by non-state actors and vulnerable countries.

The major milestones and evolution of the efforts could include:

- **KEEPING THE PROCESS ON TRACK** the Paris Agreement established a set of moments and processes that help keep up the drumbeat for ambition. It is crucial these are not degraded. As such, working to secure a creative and effective Facilitative Dialogue in 2018 and ensure a solid, honest foundation for the Paris rulebook will underpin the potential for success in 2020.
- URGENCY AND ACCELERATION it is likely, based on previous years, that early iterations of the IPCC 1.5 review could be unveiled earlier than the official dates. The 1.5 analysis will be challenging to the climate community preparation will be crucial to ensuring a well-informed discussion that does not result in despair and fatalism. Complementing this analysis alongside evidence demonstrating the non-linear potential of the low carbon economy can help to build confidence in transformational, as opposed to incremental change. This is the moment to create greater demand for ensuring that the international regime is fit to address the disruptive risks associated with climate change.
- HEROES AND STORYTELLING the California and Climate Vulnerable Summits offer incredible opportunity for state and non-state actors to outline their intent to do more by 2020 and put the challenge back to national governments. The Summit framing could emphasise that whilst non-state actors (NSAs) can and will to do more, they can only deliver the full ambition of the Paris Agreement with the aid of central government intent, policy and action. The Summit can help to celebrate the success and strength of non-state actors, by looking at past successes and what the future may hold, bringing this to life in stories that have meaning to everyday lives. In addition, the summit can work to increase their credibility to be an effective challenge function to national governments to help accelerate the scale and speed of climate action in light of the urgent science.
- TURNING NSA INTENT INTO POLITICS the momentum will need to be captured and harnessed. In 2014, this was the responsibility of the UNSG, President Hollande and President Obama. Who precisely will lead such an endeavor is not clear, but harnessing this enthusiasm will be essential. This could take various approaches through leaders' level dialogues; real-economy groups working together to advance 'saving our harvest' etc. In addition, working within the formal structure to use the Facilitative Dialogue in 2018 as the place to celebrate action, take stock of progress and a space for countries to outline their intent to do more by 2020.
- TACKLING THE WHOLE PROBLEM in 2019 the UNSG will host a Climate Summit. This Summit will be an important milestone to ensure political momentum is maintained between 2018 and 2020. Crucially, the UNSG can deploy this summit to make the concrete links between the Agenda 2030 which will be subject to review in 2020; the Conference of Biological Diversity (CBD) hosted by China in 2020, and making new pledges on protecting biodiversity; and the UNFCCC in 2020. Big initiatives that work towards solving these interlinked crises can both boost confidence in the Paris Agreement, but importantly relate climate ambition back to everyday lives. The Summit will also be an important moment for the UN system to outline how it will address some of the challenges arising from extreme climate action and impacts. The Summit should send a strong signal that no longer will issues affecting fairness, equity, impacts and non-energy mitigation be ignored.
- **ACCOUNTABILITY AND ACTION** governments respond to the calls and the interpretation of 2020 is that it is closing the gap on the Paris long-term goals and managing the full spectrum of risks associated with climate change.

CONCLUSION

The international community is not yet sufficiently prepared to address this new chapter. Now President Trump has stated his intent to pull out of the Paris Agreement, the community can now begin to plan for the future.

Some elements of the political strategy have implications upon the current modus operandi of the international climate community, both state and non-state actors.

Celebrating diversity and aligning around key moments will aggregate the incredible diversity of the climate movement and attempt to channel it into political change.

New investments in compelling evidence is required to help create confidence in non-linear potential growth in decarbonisation as well as increase the creativity of strategic communications to relate climate change to everyday lives.

The international community will need to become increasingly literate on agendas that it has only part-embraced such as like agriculture and international crisis management – in order to address the entirety of the challenge at hand.

Finally, the diversity and complexity of our community and the sophistication of our opposition and incumbents will demand more advocacy and outreach capacity by all involved. Additional agency and activism is demanded by the challenge ahead.

Notes from Non-state and Subnational Action meeting in NYC Informal meeting to coordinate analysis/aggregation of climate action pre-2018 Summit/COP September 20, 2017, UN Foundation, NYC

Attendees: Bloomberg Philanthropies (Dan Firger), CalEPA (Alexa Kleysteuber), CDP (Pedro Faria and Kate), CIFF (Constant Alarcon), Covenant of Mayors (XX), CWF (Jason Anderson and Surabi Menon), Gov. Brown's office (Aimee Barnes), Mission 2020 (Andrew Higham), NCE (Helen Mountford), NCI (Niklas Hohne), Oxford University (Thomas Hale, TCG (JC Seghers), UNF (XX), UNFCCC (James Grabert and Ian Ponce), WRI (Paula Caballero and Pankaj Bhatia), Yale (Angel Hsu)

Objective: Align our various strands of aggregation and analytical work that is either proposed or underway and which would be in service of the 2018 Global Climate Action Summit and the COP and Facilitative dialogue in 2018 to maximize impact of those moments.

Next Steps: Organize a working call on this topic on a monthly basis with two in-person meetings - in Bonn in November and then in Washington in Q1 2018

Purpose -- Share different work streams we are working on so we can be coordinated on reports being planned, meetings taking place, work in progress, gaps we identify, communication plans being developed for the near-term and longer-term.

Main highlights from discussion:

- Aggregation is not enough where are tipping points and common narrative coherent story —need a common process
- If US analysis is done, can there be one report it needs to have a broad narrative that include benefits to make it more useful. We should also have some focus on transformational examples, what others could do to inspire action.
- Any report to be produced needs to be started soon to be on time to deliver at the CA Summit in September
- Need to focus on implementation progress and not just new commitments. Tracking progress is important
- Need funders to collaborate and coordinate; best to have one integrated process
- Can this group be governed collectively through common work streams proposed and coordinated funding to support the work?
- Need to ensure communication is well integrated with any reports or methodologies presented
- How can we collectively maximize our impact and messaging at the two upcoming events and in the longer term?

Ongoing Work—Needs to be refined based on input from participants.

Bloomberg: Funder of many initiatives - Global Covenant of Mayors, America's Pledge, focused on US as a case study on how to do the work and communicate political and narrative element; interested in global piece as well.

Cal EPA: Engaged with America's Pledge, and how it could be replicated to rest of the world.

CDP: Are a natural lead for data streams — interested in collaboration in a coordinated way and a common measurement standard

CIFF: Have been supporting C-40 work

ClimateWorks: Supporting methodology guidance document on NSA through ICAT (WRI and NCI are leading this work with TCG, CDP and WMB), application of methodology in countries; supporting a separate global aggregation effort led by Yale, PBL and NCI

Covenant of Mayors: Looking at aggregate potential of 74 mayors released at COP —working with WRI plans to work on a report

Mission 2020 with UNFCCC discussed four work streams they are focused on -Methodology for metrics, methodology for aggregation, NAZCA, aggregation (ANDREW PLEASSE CORRECT)

NCE with WRI: New report coming out in September on economy and climate - looks at success for growth and economic and social indicators

Oxford through Groundswell: Coordination of data, information sharing, looking at gaps

TCG: Leading work through the Under 2 coalition and are engaged on 181 jurisdictions

UNF: Consumers of work

UNFCCC NAZCA: Working on NAZCA evolution to next phase, with CA EPA involved in aggregation and pooling of data to bring into facilitative dialogue

WRI: Work stream 1 - GHG protocol proposal - data reporting, aggregation principals, natl. and global aggregation, reporting and communication

Yale: Work stream 4 — global data base —preliminary version —working on it - early Nov to get something out there

Yale, PBL, NCI: Global Aggregation work ongoing

Missed inviting a few organizations - C40, ICLEI, Finance component (e.g. 2 degree investing)

Thanks so much for all your leadership and hustle on getting the Paris letter out earlier this week. It definitely would not have happened without you both.

I have been thinking about the Governor's Climate Alliance thing, and talking with Rick and Hewlett. My sense (I think you guys have already been here for a while... what can I say, I'm slow) is that it doesn't work as configured in their proposal, but that we do have a need for more capacity than we have at present--it can't always be us staff running around trying to corral each other for sign on, and that we could also use some help both with horizon-scanning for potential challenges and thinking more strategically about how to broadcast our collective voices internationally.

I drafted an email which I am going to send around to the email chain from the Paris letter to this effect, to see if we can get a call set up next week to discuss whether and how we might all collaborate either through existing or new mechanisms on these issues. See below and let me know what you think. I'm sensitive to not wanting to be the 800 pound Californian gorilla, but I do think based on the Paris letter experience that we could use a little more help, and it doesn't make sense for any one of our states to necessarily be the main driver, although we all have to have a stake in it.
